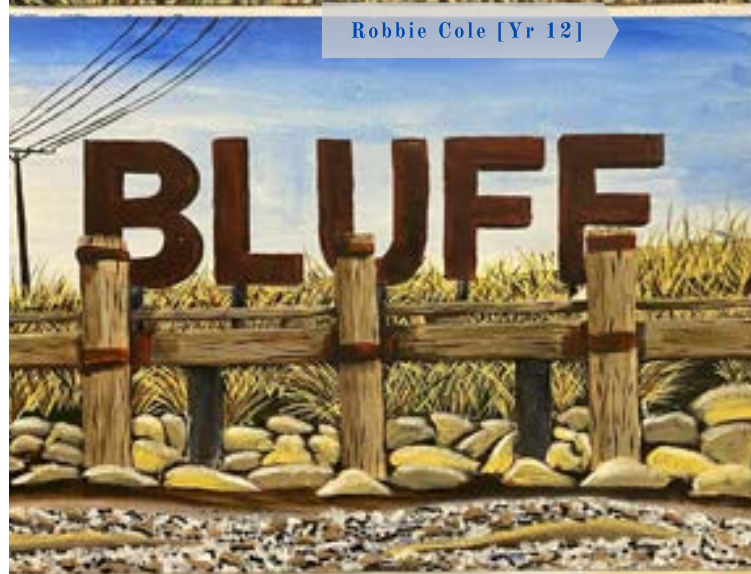




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from the Rector

2020 is undoubtedly one for the history books and a challenge to us all in a connected and global world which was built on predictability, planning and instant gratification.

Our young leaders, led this year by Michael Kuresa as Head Boy with George Heenan, Callum Nimmo and Sam Clarke as his Deputies, rose strongly to this challenge. They led the charge on social media with their own stories and goals encouraging others to share and challenge themselves during lockdown. This not only kept up the school spirit but engaged the boys in physical activity and connectedness and for this we as a school are thankful. Well done to our student leaders of 2020.

As we look forward then into a future of changing normal we must continue to support each other and especially our young people in being resilient and adaptable, secure on their own footings and willing to learn from times that don't go the way that was planned or hoped for. As politically incorrect as it may be to support them to learn from failings and failures, never has the school motto been more appropriate.

from the Head Boy

Maloi e soifua I tatou matua matatua. Tama Tina uso ma tuafafine, Fa'afetai mole avanoa ua tu'uina mai mo au, aua se sao mo lenei po taua, ua faasinotonu mo matou Le fanau.

Firstly I'd like to give thanks to the man above for blessing us with yet another school year. I am honoured to represent my fellow year 13s as we bid farewell to Southland Boys'. I trust I speak on behalf of the entire class of 2020 when I say that this year has really emphasised the most important keys in life: to be resilient when times get tough, and to stay true to yourself.

When your time at school is described, no one thinks that they'll be spending a large part of their final year at home. But 2020 broke the rulebook - homes became schools, bedrooms became classrooms, parents became teachers. That is, if you think of a school as simply a building. My school is more than that. It's collaboration, it's maturity, it's diligence, it's unity. We are on a journey together, and everyone had a hand on the wheel. I am so proud of everyone for holding a tight grip and contributing to our amazing journey.

Lockdown was a long pit stop for some, but I know for a fact that for many in this community, it was a chance to build skills. It was time to get better at what we're already good at. To everyone that supported our Boys' High community, thank you, because without the strength and determination throughout, we wouldn't have been able to keep the Boys' High connection we call a brotherhood alive.

A very wise man brought to my attention a strong quote put together in 5 words. "With adversity, we get better." I continued to communicate this quote to the prefects and to the school, while trying to find answers myself. The more I communicated it and questioned myself, the more I allowed myself to spread my wings and answer them naturally. During my time at Southland Boys', I've found that the positive peace of mind and one's actions reveal the most powerful, thought provoking and truthful outcomes.

Now for me, School is like a song-writing process. A process of 3 parts naturally woven into a very clever and fulfilling ending. The first part of songwriting is the "choose an idea and determine whether you're interested enough to sustain it" In the schooling context, it was simply "choose a high school I think I will like". Enrolling for a high school for me was made rather simple by the people around me - my brothers and cousins who forced me to come here. This force was never turned down and was met with curiosity and excitement with the possibility of being part of the most prestigious school in Southland.

The next part of songwriting is where you get comfortable with the item you are producing. Get to know the song and what it stands for. Analyse and understand why you're still going ahead with the song. This part helps me reminisce about the fond memories I've made throughout my Southland Boys' journey.

My journey at Southland Boys' High School began in 2014 when I arrived as the chubbiest year 7 that this school has processed. I only realised, while writing this speech that my parents tried to help my case by making me walk on the first day of school.

Although I would arrive at school everyday covered in sweat from the 5 minute walk, I was always grateful for the sacrifices my parents made for me along my journey. They say that "behind every child who believes in himself, is a parent who believed in them first." It is very simple. I have more love for my parents than any other heart could hold. I trust I speak on behalf of the class of 2020 when I say thank you to all the parents.

One of my first significant memories at Southland Boys' High School was the new entrant powhiri service. As I sat in the pool of new entrants, I looked up to former Rector, Ian Baldwin as he elaborated on the Boys' High way, the sense of unity and pride in our school that contributed to the men we are today. I am thankful that the first face we saw was one to remember.

Whether you've been here for seven years or one, you will all know what it means to be a Southland Boys' High student. There's no way I can stand here and describe what it means to you to be a Southland Boys' High School Student but I can describe what I've felt over the last 7 years at this school.

I can say that I am the proudest member of the Uttley house despite the fact that we get robbed each year. It is through House Competitions though that I have felt the sense of unity and compassion. I have felt perseverance and comradeship through sporting events and interschools.

I have felt respect and true compassion through the annual ANZAC assembly. I had always felt that the definitive display of school pride from my time at Southland Boys was laying witness to the annual ANZAC assembly. The display of compassion and respect that is shown toward those who sacrificed their lives for the future of their country is something I encourage all to experience.

A single event would go on to be one of the defining moments of my schooling career. I happened to be on stage in the school hall with a guitar in my arms and a microphone in front of me. As I looked out, a sea of navy blue, white shirts and blue blazers grabbed my attention. I noticed that equally, the attention was drawn to me. Like nothing I've ever heard of, the entire school of young men sing the lyrics back to me. "When ever you're in trouble won't you stand by me, whoa stand by me." I wish that moment could have gone on forever, but I like my weekends.



The fact that I am a student having my classmates sing back to me is big. But the fact that I am a musician is even bigger. To have 800 Southland men feel comfortable enough to sing with me no matter how bad they sound gave me courage to pursue this career as a musician. It made me feel as though I could do anything. And that is something I will treasure and take away with me - the self-drive and belief in myself to follow my dreams.

They say "don't ever let somebody tell you that you can't follow your dreams". But I reckon let them. Let them tell you that you should have done this instead of that. Because what does it matter what they say? It only matters what you do. You define what success is for you.

For me success lives down a very clear path that leads closely to my heart. And this year I have been a very successful person. I felt success when my dad came up on stage during my Tauluga at Polyfest while my grandmother sat watching with a tear in her eye. I felt success when I gave my little brother advice and he capitalised on it the very next day. I'm successful when my parents and family are proud of me. Family is the key to what shapes me as a person and if I could ever pay them back with pride, I am successful in life.

Find what makes you and only you successful and happy. Always value and applaud the success of others but never let it dictate your own definition of success.

A sporting moment which made me recognise this was after the first 15 semi final as we all stood in a huddle, dreading a loss from Kings High School. The coach said "At the start of the season, I would have given them 60 points to nil just looking at their size. But we didn't give it to them for a second and it comes from something sacred. Somewhere deep under here."

The symbolism was in the tear that ran down my face as my Southland Boys' Journey flashed before my eyes. It represents something that cannot be taught and most definitely comes from something deep under here. The pride in our school. Southland Boys' High School offers students a sense of belonging. A place where they can be proud of their own culture and identity. A place that boys can be proud of.

I want to thank every individual behind me for preparing me for the future. I am so grateful to be at a school where staff value the importance of making not only the school great, but the students themselves.

- My year 7 teacher Steve Broad, who encouraged me to get up at year 7 and 8 assembly to perform a song. Mr Broad helped my true journey start, not just as a student but as a person and for that I am thankful.

- I owe a very special thank you to one of the only staff who can say "island time" when I'm late, Miss Schmidt. Your influence, not just through Toa Moana or as the careers advisor but as a true mentor and friend has also hugely contributed to the man I am today, and for that I say thank you. You've helped me realise that you should be proud of your identity and stay true to yourself. Things change because it is what it is. No matter what, your heritage is something that simply remains the same, and I could not be more proud. Toa Moana will miss your individual brilliance in the future, and I hope someone else can fulfill your role of buying the fish n chips for lunch.
- I'm always thankful for Mr. Coe and Mr Laurensen for giving me the opportunity of uplifting the head prefect role. The day of Lockdown, I sent Mr Laurensen an email to thank himself and Mr Coe for their outstanding leadership. He sent back this. "The ability to be in control comes from completely trusting those around you to have your back." Although this is true, I also believe that the strength of leadership needs to be admired first before it is backed. I admire and praise your hard work and dedication to this school so therefore, I will always have your back.

In light of people having your back, I would like to acknowledge the deputy head prefects who always offered to put my mind at ease when times weren't the easiest. I'm proud of the prefect team for always putting their hand up. Like Mr Laurensen said, control comes from completely trusting those around you to have your back. I trust that you guys will not change in the future as natural born leaders.

To the future head prefects, good luck. I think we all know I've taken one for the team as Head Prefect in 2020, so I hope you are blessed with a full school year. The community is now in your hands, cherish the moments that make you most proud to be a part of this brotherhood and enjoy the journey.

So'o o le fau ile fau - unity is strength. When one attaches to another, they become stronger. This brings me to the last stage of songwriting. The stage where I can enjoy the final product and share it with the world. I can now say that I am proud of what I have added to the legacy and I will forever enjoy sharing my Southland Boys' journey.

Now as future old boys of this school, we often try to grasp the memories that were prominent to us and made us feel like we have made our mark at this school. If there is anything to take away with us this evening, it would be to hold on to that pride and never forget your roots, because there really is no other place like Southland Boys' High School.

from the BoT

My name is Janice Ormsby, and it is my privilege to write as Chairperson on behalf of the Board of Trustees.

What a year! I can't begin to describe what we have done as a country but perhaps in the future once the borders open and we really see and hear what the rest of the world has experienced we will truly appreciate how lucky we really are to live in this beautiful country at the bottom of the South Pacific. And it is with the spirit of gratitude, celebration, and appreciation that I will speak tonight.

Southland Boys' High School is a place where traditions and old school values are the cornerstone of our mission to motivate and inspire all students to achieve their best, whether that be academically, culturally or physically in order that they will contribute in our community. We celebrate those boys who epitomise those words from our mission statement. They are Boys' High students - they are learning to think for themselves, to understand their role in society and to seek out the tools from parents, teachers, and mentors that they will need for the road ahead.

In 2019, after an absence of 40 years, we awarded the first of six academic caps. This year that number almost tripled to 16. At this year's Blues awards I saw a number of young men who were triple recipients across academics, sports and culture - these are the examples of a good man who can cross over boundaries and societal pressure and uphold the highest honour in society to be good citizens and give service to your community. Ka nui te mihi kia koutou Rangatira ma! I applaud your successes, your hard work and sacrifices. You are the role models for your peers and those who come after you.

The Board has made significant investments this year to support students. We predict that we will start 2021 with a roll of between 1120 and 1150 students, with an increased roll in Years 7, 9, 11, 12 and 13! In order to maintain small class sizes in the Junior school we will be creating an extra class to keep sizes down in the mid-20s.

The Board has made significant investments in learning and property this year for both school and Coldstream Hostel. Some include:

- Major technology upgrades to hardware and equipment have allowed better access to Wi-Fi across the school and that has allowed us to be able to invest in 5 COWs, otherwise known as computers on wheels. Each COW contains 30 laptops and with 2 more to come in 2021 we will see 150 laptops in moving technology cabinets across the school.
- Junior mathematics programmes have received a well-deserved and long-awaited significant boost in teaching and learning resources.
- The Robotics programme has received more funding to support an ever-growing programme due to the increased number of students interested in electronics.
- Property upgrades over the next 5 years include the reroofing of the historic Pearce block and alterations to upper floor of Uttley block to create more light, ventilation and break out spaces for students to work in, as already completed this year in the library and junior block.
- On Queens Drive where the former Coldstream swimming pool was situated, you will have noticed major digging works going on. We expect that by the time school starts again in February there will be a completed turf for football and hockey.
- Coldstream Hostel has seen a massive amount of investment over the last 5 years including a new roof, painting, carpets, gas water systems and at the moment a new heating system which will replace the original coal-fired

- heating and water systems. No doubt the residents of Gladstone will applaud the improvement to their air quality as there is no longer smoke belching out of our hostel chimney into their residential zone. This is a Board investment as hostels do not receive any funding support from the Ministry of Education.
- At the December board meeting we agreed to repaint the cricket pavilion, the oldest building on our site predating the building of the school by 9 years and also not attracting any Ministry of Education property funding.

I have a number of amazing people to thank who support our school tirelessly, most of them as unpaid volunteers.

Parent representatives on the Board, Sarah Brown, Emma Smaill, Charlene Withy, Paul Stirling, Cam Froude, Warren Ruwhiu staff representative, George Heenan our outgoing Student rep and Jackson Ronald our incoming student rep, Simon Coe our Rector, Jo Keary School's Accountant and Board Secretary Nicola Roberts; thank you all so very much for your unfailing commitment and contributions to the ongoing governance work that ensures we can invest in students and staff and provide them with the resources to lift achievement.

To Victoria O'Connell, Nicole Murrell and the Parent Teacher Association thank you all for your work throughout the year. It's been difficult for you to run events for the benefit of our students but as always you get it done. Once again, we look forward to working with you next year. I want to make a very special mention to Dee Heenan who has given a number of years of time and commitment to the PTA and to Southland Boys High School. I have heard stories about muffins and other treats for the breakfast club and the love and care you put into ensuring all of our boys are supported no matter who they are or where they come from. Thank you, Dee. To the Rugby club and school supporters thank you for building stage one of our grandstand on the Number one field - build it and they will come! It makes watching a game from the hill really pleasant on a nice Southland winters day and it's super posh!

To the parents who support our sports, cultural and academics teams from rugby, hockey, and football through to chess and debating, thank you all so very much for your support coaching and managing teams. You bring experience and skills that support us to be able to provide wide variety of extra-curricular programmes for the benefits of our students.

To all our teaching and support staff, we know that you go beyond the call of duty and commit additional time and skills to ensure our students receive the best education.

To Sue and the team at Coldstream Hostel, ka mau te wehi! You do an amazing job providing a home away from home for students and this year we farewell Pauline who has given many years to the Hostel. Be well and enjoy retirement.

Finally, I must thank Rector, Simon Coe and his very capable and committed management team. The School is well managed as shown by the level of financial investment in resources, Board funded staffing positions, and yet again increased roll numbers for 3 years in a row. You provide calm, steady, and reassuring leadership that allows your team to challenge their thinking, push the boundaries and test the status quo. Simon, you can be very proud of what you and the team have achieved this year, despite its trials and tribulations, and a steady hand at the helm is what our students and staff required to get through the year.

Blokes and Sheds

In the beginning:

In mid-2000, eight families met in the SBHS Staffroom, along with School staff, to plan a Cultural Tour to Kumagaya Boys' High School for 2001. Various fundraising options were discussed, such as quiz nights, raffles, BBQ's etc. One of the mothers present, Judith Cambridge, suggested a Blokes Tour, as Jim Hopkins' TV series and book "Blokes & Sheds", had been released a year or two previously.

I thought this sounded a good idea, and offered to arrange it, whilst the others followed up on other fundraisers. With a few suggestions in hand, such as Bill Richardson's Truck collection which I had already seen, I duly confirmed five available sheds, arranged bus hire, prepared an itinerary, and we commenced selling tickets for a tour in February 2001.

We were very pleased with sales - three busloads of Blokes were keen to go on the inaugural Mystery Tour. I then had to arrange two more Tour Leaders! All ran smoothly, and with a pie and a beer for smoko en route, the Blokes seemed to enjoy the variety of Blokes & Sheds visited. As some were leaving the bus, they suggested there be another tour next year. At the time, the Tour was planned as a one-off only, for the Kumagaya exchange. Being on the SBHS Board of Trustees at the time, I was aware that the PTA were often looking for new fundraisers, so I approached

the PTA Chairperson, Ian Russell [yes, a bloke!] who I already knew personally. Ever since then [2002] the Tour has been a fundraiser for the PTA.

The trip to Kumagaya was great, with the following Japanese language students going there for the 2 week term break: Michael Fraser, Sam Wilson, William de Ruyter, Greg Bowie, Tim McLean, Jonathan Paulin, James Cambridge, and Jay Coote. They were accompanied by teachers Midori Sasaki and Raewyn Dockrill, and I went as a parent help.

Looking back:

Who would have thought that we would be still doing tours in 2020? 20 tours of five sheds, less a couple, seeing that we have been to Richardson's Truck Museum three times [before it transformed into today's Transport World], equals 98 different sheds.

Some contained hobbies or collections, some were workshops, some commercial or industrial, and some were just for social purposes. Some sheds were new and custom built, some were old and full of character, some huge, and some small and pokey. But they all showed classic "Kiwi blokedom" at its best, ranging from the professional approach, to "number 8 wire" ingenuity.

McDermott's have supplied the buses over the years, with some drivers regularly lining up for Sunday duty so as to do the tour. The humble pie for smoko was exchanged for the

PTA-run BBQ. Soft drinks were also included, rather than beer alone, for those blokes who preferred it, as well as the "blokettes" and "apprentice blokes" who also attend.

The five shed itinerary still works, as it did on day one – some sheds warrant more than a half hour visit, but with 3 or 4 buses on the tour, following each other in a big circuit, a timetable is necessary.

We have had various Tour Leaders over the years, with most being Old Boys of the school. Others have been teachers, or PTA members.

The local media – newspaper, radio and TV, have been very supportive over the years, giving the tour coverage and visibility both before and after the event.

The school has also assisted, printing posters and tickets, and promoting in School Newsletters. The ICC Ticket Office has sold tickets for us. We thank all of them for this.

People ask how I source all these sheds, but it is a mixture of methods. A few 'sheddies' have approached me directly, and some I read about in the paper. I have tracked some down through Citizens' Advice Bureau records, but mostly it is through being "dobbed in" by a bloke who knows a bloke with a shed, and I make contact in due course.

Jim Hopkins has attended on 3 occasions, coming down from Christchurch, or wherever he may have been entertaining at the time. We

also held Blokes & Sheds themed debates to fully utilise his humour whilst he was in town. We have regular attendees, some coming from as far away as Te Anau or Lumsden, and there are a few who have only missed one tour. We had an Austrian family of four on board one year – they had been to the Farmers' Market, and joined us at the School gates. They said it was a highlight of their travels. With the Fathers' Day promotion, we had three generations of the same family, two Old Boys and one student, on board one year.

Highlights? Plenty of them, but in particular it is the fascinating array of Blokes and Sheds that we continue to find in and around Invercargill.

It has been a pleasure to work with the PTA on these tours for so long, but maybe we are getting low on new choices, and it's time for me to retire to my own small Shed!

from the Archivist

There is less to report from this unprecedented Covid year, but the history of our school remained safely shrouded in darkness ready to re-emerge and tell us all the significant stories from our school years since 1881. I have relocated the photos of our first four rectors; GW Blanchflower B.A. (London), HL Fowler M.A. (Oxford), AH Highton. M.A. (Cambridge) and TD Pearce M.A. (N.Z.) - to a more prominent position on the main aisle.

Before lockdown all the new entrants with their teachers as usual had a week of getting acquainted with the Museum by way of information tasks. These are set to send them exploring the different bays and time zones of our collections and so to learn the school's history.

Although on the school front it was a quiet year for the Museum, the volume of enquiries to the archivist from all over the country and internationally was unprecedented.

Obviously, a favourite lockdown activity for Old Boys was to check out their schooldays and those of their fathers and grandfathers. Now having all Southlandians digitised online was very helpful and timely.

Regarding pandemics, we have been here before. The 'Spanish' influenza epidemic in 1918 resulted in this comment in the Southlandian: '*... The school has already been dismissed a week owing to the prevalence of influenza in the city. There are a few thousand cases at present. Some have been fatal and*

many serious but the great majority we believe, are more or less mild. About 40% of the school has been mildly attacked by it with several of the Staff. Business in the city is at present practically paralysed. The Tram system is on the point of paralysis. The disease has doubtless been brought to the city from the north...'

Coldstream Origins: I was asked to check the origins of our school Hostel name 'Coldstream'. The town of Coldstream on the Scottish borders was the original home of the Coldstream Guards.

The story is very much a part of the history of early Invercargill. The suburb we now know as Gladstone used to be called Coldstream and it was there on more than 6 acres that a very grand house, called 'Oldfield' was built. It was 'a truly magnificent property', built of brick and containing 16 rooms 'large and lofty', with conservatory, stables, and coach houses, and all the conveniences attached necessary for a first-class home. The grounds were tastefully laid out and abundantly planted with forest trees. They included a tennis court, bowling green and croquet lawn, all planted with a large number of beautiful flowering shrubs. The garden was also well stocked with fruit trees.

The house was bought by Mr J. G. Ward, who was a Member of Parliament at various times from 1887, and Prime Minister from 1906 to 1912.

The Southland Times reported that the celebrated American Author Mark Twain ('Tom Sawyer' and 'Huckleberry Finn') stayed in the house with J.G.Ward during his speaking tour of New Zealand in November 1895. This story about the Hostel's connection to this famous author can be seen in a display in our school Museum.

The whole property was purchased for the site of a new Southland Boys' High School boarding hostel in 1946. By February 1952 the house, by then derelict, had been removed and all that remained on the original sections forming the block bounded by Queens Drive, Herbert St, Lees St, and Lewis St, were a few trees on the street boundaries.

The still extant and elegant cast iron gates on Queens Drive (which have never been moved) formed the original grand entrance to 'Oldfield', the house having been located in the very centre of this block.

This **Coldstream Hostel** sign stood for many years at the Hostel's Queens Drive entrance. Neville Brinsdon and family were resident managers from 1984 to 1997. In the early 1990s, after the family had been away for a few days they noticed the sign missing! In the mid 1990s the sign was sighted in Dunedin attached to a fence of a flat in the University area . . . Somehow, years later, it ended up on the Brinsdon's doorstep wrapped in newspaper. (Returned by an apologetic Old Boy student prankster?) So the sign, battered

and with the 's' scratched out to read COLDSTREAM HOTEL, is now displayed for fun in our Museum. Perhaps some of the students guilty of this prank will see it there some day!

Sarah Gallagher representing Heritage New Zealand has recently spent research time in our school Museum. She was especially intrigued by the above story as she is the editor of the recently published very entertaining book *Scarfie Flats* (2019 Imagination Press). Her main enquiries centred on the history of the Pearce block and I was able to provide her with information as well as original plans, some of which are archivally framed in our Museum and others which have been lodged with Mollison architects. She recorded much of what is in our Museum including the photo display of the earthquake strengthening of the Pearce Block. She did express concern regarding the impact of the creeper on the brickwork of the north facade of the Pearce block.

Once again, I have listed our Museum to be open to the public over two days during Heritage month, March 2021.

ANZAC

In 2020, a year unlike any other because of the Covid pandemic, our traditional ANZAC ceremony could not be held in April under lockdown. So, on the 21st October, 25 of our young men joined Mr Laurensen and Mrs Dear in an otherwise empty school hall to remember the 25 fallen, alphabetically from Douglas Coster to Morrison Jolly, who were killed during World War II.

When we remember our fallen from the First World War, we are remembering boys who attended the old school in Conon Street, but those killed in WWII were present in this same Herbert Street building, the current site of Southland Boys' High. Each soldier, sailor and airman whose photo and biography was carried the length of the Hall would have recognised that same school Hall. In the foyer is a large photo of the new Herbert Street school with all the pupils lined up outside. Many of those boys would have served in or been killed in WWII.

Two particular battles took many of the lives of our boys who were involved in them. At El Alamein in 1942, the NZ division under the Allied General Bernard Montgomery led the breakthrough, which resulted in victory over the German army - at the cost of over 10,000 lives. Then in early 1944 came the most brutal

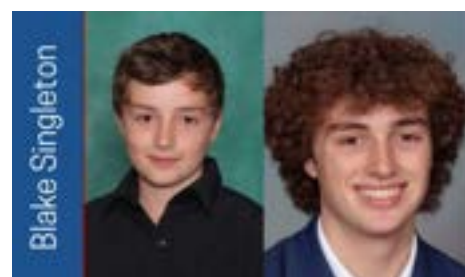
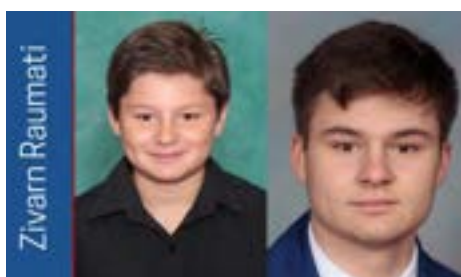
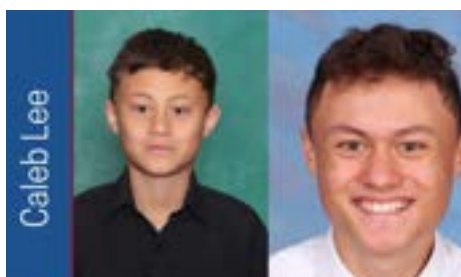
and costly battle of the War. The Germans held the Monastery on a 500m high escarpment above the town of Cassino in Italy. It fell to New Zealand and Polish troops at the cost of many more thousands of lives, both Allied and German. Among our former pupils killed were the Dickens brothers [Bruce and Lloyd], Alan Galbraith and James Henderson at El Alamein. At Cassino; Douglas Coster, Gordon Crow, Reece Fearn, James Gordon, Matthew Hamilton, Geoff Gregory Hargest, George Harrington and Francis Harris. George Harrington was injured at El Alamein and survived only to be killed at Cassino.

In 2020, our remembrance ceremony lacked the stunning all-school Haka and the stirring music of Holst and Elgar - but took place in a Hall which was empty apart from the Year 13 'Poppy Boys' - each representing one of our fallen - as well as Mr Laurensen and Mrs Dear. In a strange way this made our commemoration of our war dead all the more poignant and upsetting because it had been stripped to its bare and brutal essence. The Year 13 students involved were visibly affected by the death of each young man they represented - young men not much older than they are and who had spent their own school days in the school which is now, and always will be, theirs.

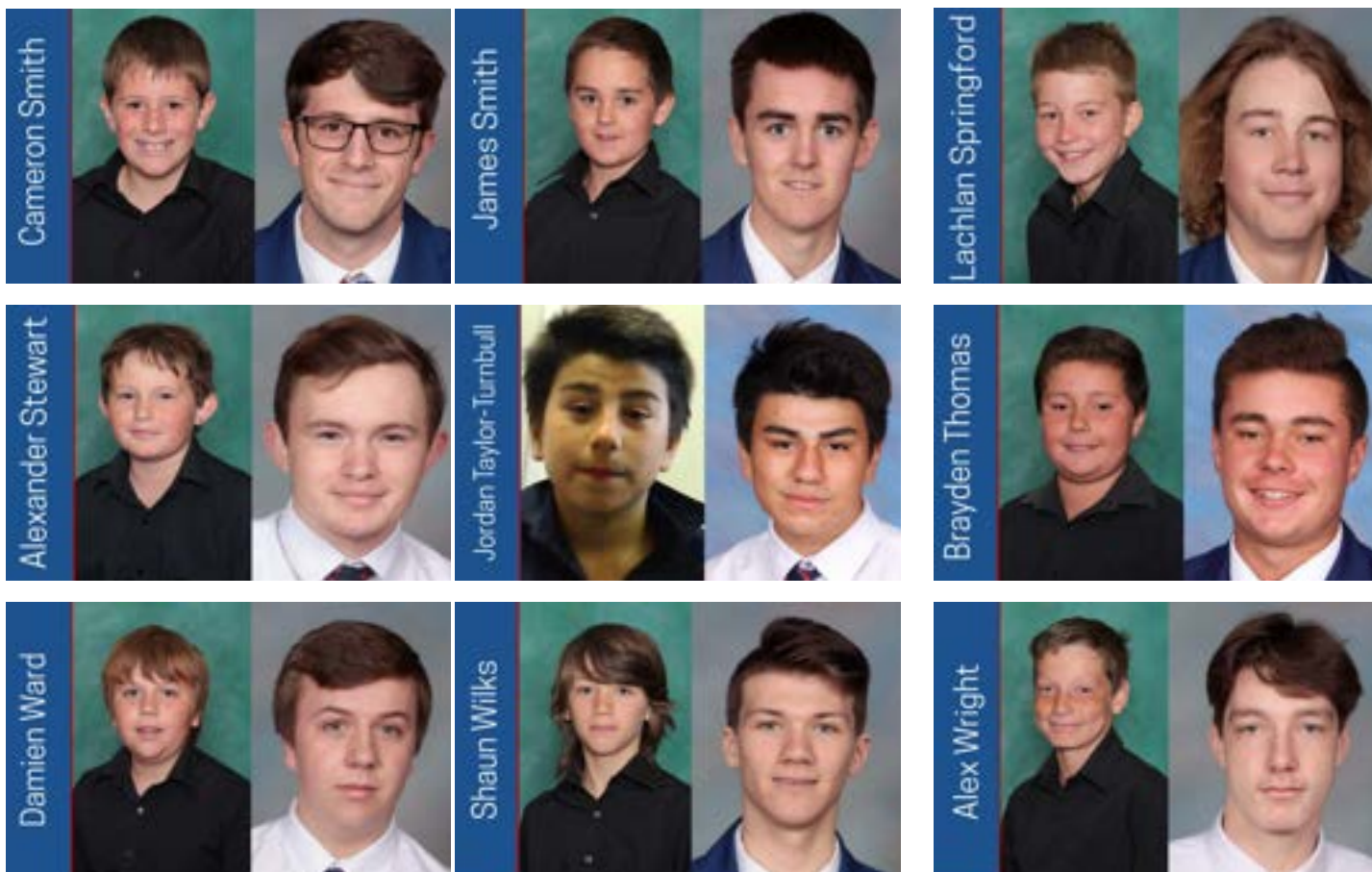

Year 7 Fire Service Visit

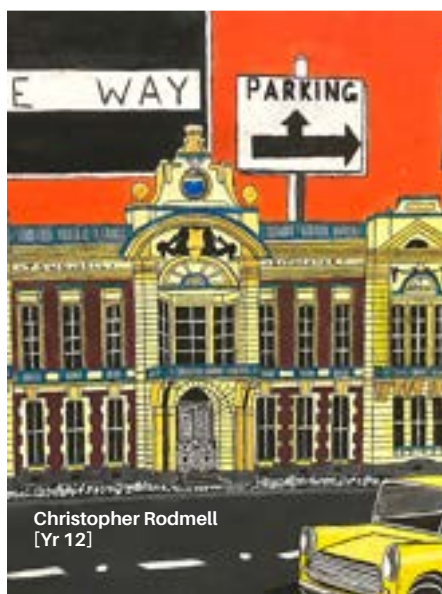

Each team was given the moot and told if they were the affirmative or negative team. In that 30 minutes, they had to put their debate together and then present it to the Adjudicator.

Digital Technologies

The 2020 Digital Technologies curriculum was tested during the lockdown, making the most of the Microsoft 365 platform and YouTube tutorials that were created for the students' remote learning. Although progress was made, the presence of a teacher and collaboration between students within a classroom is far more effective for student learning.

Technologies and software never stop changing and this year the new web coding practices were overhauled to account for the recent release of the CSS grids system. This was a challenge and change to the way of thinking for students but gave greater flexibility to layout and design. This created a new direction for the web project while giving the students a means to vent and express their views after the lock down.

You get on. You fall. You get on. You fall. You wonder why you wanted a bicycle for your birthday. You get on. You fall.

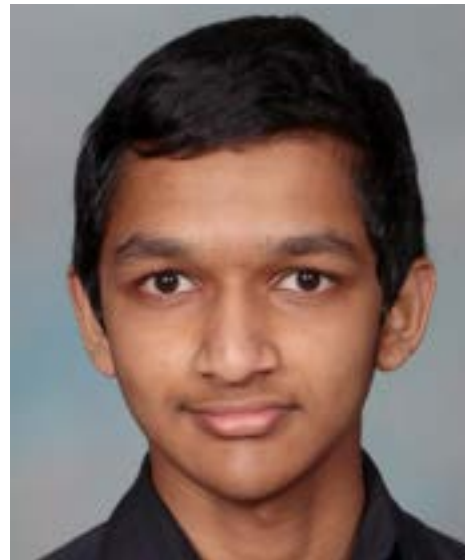
This is what the whole world is, even when we are not learning how to ride a bike. Getting up and falling down. Getting up again. It might be trying to perfect a school assessment that your teacher had said isn't good enough, or not giving up when you're down by ten points in a game of basketball. Or it might just be enjoying good days and getting through bad days. In all these instances, you don't just do it for no reason. You do it because you have some hope, as tiny as it may be, that you will get an Excellence for the assessment, that you will shoot four three-pointers in the last minute, that tomorrow might be a good, or even a great day. You do it because you hope that doing this will make your future brighter, from lollies and better grades to filling in emotional voids with happiness.

But what you see when you look at the world is that hope is one of the hardest things to feel since the paths for hope are getting bulldozed every second. But it is one of the most important things because when you enter society all alone, hope is what keeps you going.

You look at the world and think what 'future' is. The dictionary says it is time that is yet to come. But it's not merely something out there that works completely randomly. It depends on what we do now and how we do it. You work hard; you get it. You don't care; you don't get it. They say you're never too small to make a difference. What 'difference' means is going out of your way to do things. It doesn't matter whether it is 'small' or 'big.' We see people sharing their lunch with a person who forgot to bring it or picking up rubbish after others. They don't do it because they have to. Instead, it's the hope for a better future, even if you don't have the faintest idea of the future at that moment.

It's the simple principle that what you do now affects what happens to you next. It's the feeling that you've done something for yourself, for others or for the planet. It's the contentment you get after the garden is free of rubbish, and the honest smiling face and the gratitude you receive.

For example, we see young people speaking up against climate change. Traditionally, you won't find school children arguing against government policies, but the future isn't traditional. It's dynamic and more or less unpredictable. And this future is what young people consider before stepping out of traditional boundaries. Almost all the people in the world know about climate change. This includes the people who make the laws. But for many years, there weren't enough steps being taken to stop it, even when scientists were backed by whole loads of evidence. Sea levels rising. Bush fires dancing. Temperatures doing vertical jumps. Animals dying, either from droughts or from hunger. Glaciers melting, along with our futures. But for some, this was just a problem for the 'science-people'. It wasn't until people started matching the dots, connecting it to our lives that they started caring about it.



And young people played a large role in making them understand and showing that the future is something to care about, that if you don't look ahead, you won't see the red lights. Why did they do this? Not because they wanted something to do in their free time, but because they hoped for a future where they could live

without being buried with famines and droughts, a future where living is possible.

If you look at our planet, you will see that among the many things that shine and glitter, it's overflowing with problems. And those problems don't seem to finish any time soon. Poverty. Click. Food insecurity. Click. Wars. Click. Diseases. If you look clearly enough, it's like a river, when one problem flows to the sea, another starts flowing.

For example, the first cases of covid-19 were reported just as 2020 started. People might have had plans for the new year, to do something new, or maybe just go for a vacation. But did they get the chance to do it? No. Stay home, no objections accepted. No one, not even the most powerful or richest person in the world could stop it. It spread quickly, cases going up in exponents. You couldn't go to the street and protest against it (and if you did, there is a higher chance of catching the virus). You couldn't drop nuclear bombs to make it disappear.

This shows how unpredictable the world could be. All you could do was stay at home and hope and hope and hope. No one could tell that the future is safe, that you could go all alone into the world and remain untouched. That is why you don't have vendors selling blueprints of the future. You've simply got to be ready to face whatever comes. It could be a pandemic or a tsunami. You never know.

But what is important is to understand that you can only control a small part of the future. And that controllable part is there to be used to its final drop because that is what helps you reach the future you dreamt of. You may make a difference.

If you do, great. If you don't, remember that 'difference' isn't defined by a dictionary. It is how you define it that is important. It is how you feel about you and your future that matters. If you feel safe about your future, if you feel happy and hopeful about it, if you feel that you could look forward to your future, you've succeeded. And that is what all of us should work towards.

Science

This was the third year of running mixed ability classes from Years 7 to 11 General Science. We continue to see greater student engagement, more group work and shared planning across the Faculty. Further, the internal assessments rely more heavily upon portfolio study [all achievement standard based] with multiple learning contexts and provision for Achieved, Merit or Excellence exit points. With the mixed ability classes scenario now being advocated by the School for all Junior learning areas the Faculty will have few new teaching challenges for 2021.

Senior Science

As part of the school wide initiative, all Departments were obliged to deliver their Internal NCEA assessments before covering External NCEA assessments [derived grade plus formal learning and preparation for the final assessments]. The new arrangement was actioned with little difficulty and enabled earlier estimation of positive and negative trends in student results on the journey towards their NCEA goals.

This year has seen continued growth in primary industry education. The Faculty provided three different opportunities for students within this domain, specifically: vocational pathways via the Primary Industry Trades Organisation [PITO]; Agricultural Science [tertiary pathway]; and the Agribusiness course. External moderation and outside provider audits have shown that we are meeting quality of materials and delivery. These courses contribute towards one of only two Centres of Academic Excellence in Ag/Hort Education in the South.

Health and Safety Regulations specifically regarding Secondary School Laboratories and Workspaces have generated new Hazard Plans and a Hazard Register. The school successfully operates and maintains an up-to-date database of hazardous substances and hazards associated with Science Laboratory and associated science activities.



Junior Science

There have been healthy numbers in Junior Science with seven classes at Year 10, six classes at Year 9, and twelve classes at Year 7 and 8. NZCER testing indicates learning issues centered around reading in particular featuring in our young boys. Therefore, a priority for the Faculty remains literacy and in particular Science Literacy. Testing data indicates that the Faculty continues to add value to the boys' fundamental science skills.

Exceptional Performance in Junior Science

Oshadha Perera has been successful in various science competitions throughout the year. During term 2 he won the 'NASA Scientist for a Day' competition, where students entered an essay through the New Zealand Space Agency. He was able to have his winning entry published on the NASA website. In Term 3, Oshadha also received prizes and financial rewards from the Wellington Regional Science Fair. He won the ESR microbiology award, and the Wellington library award for his project on the risk of NCEA papers as a vector to spread pathogens, entitled "Marking Pathogens". Oshadha entered of his own volition as there was no such event in Southland this year, and further sent his study to Microbiologists at several research and medical institutions. He has received encouraging advice from these experts on taking his study further.

Many senior students in Geography, History, Commerce and Media studies continued to gain NCEA credits through this period. As a faculty, we are now far better placed, as are the students, to continue to progress if distance learning were to be implemented again.

From a staff perspective the most pleasing and noticeable aspect of the year is the resilience that so many young men demonstrated

2021 will be chance to reset for us all. The Social Sciences Department have begun the process of streamlining of units and topics in Social Studies at years 9 and 10. Staff are working hard on assessment schedules and unit outlines in order to deliver consistent and meaningful topics and assessment, which will be accessible for all students, regardless of ability.

We will also be able to reinstate the cross-curricular Geography/Biology field trip to Milford Sound at Year 12 in Term 1, and a day trip to Queenstown for Year 13 Geography in Term 2. This opportunity will provide the students with much needed 'hands on' access to environments they will be studying throughout the year.

A particular highlight of 2021 came in the form of short films made by our year 12 Media Studies students. These were very professional in their approach and tackled storylines involving the Pearce block and the paranormal! A special mention to Jake Kura-Warepouri for his outstanding acting. A huge thank you to Simone Cameron for all her hard work in helping the boys complete their movies.

A big thankyou also to Ray 'Al Pacino' Laurenson and Pip 'Meryl Streep' Smith for demonstrating their considerable acting talents in the short films. Geography - Yr 12 Weather Study

As part of our Year 12 Geography course we recently took a series of wind readings at various locations around the school.

The aim of our research is to determine how much of an influence buildings and vegetation [trees in particular] have on wind speed and direction. We took readings on the open area of the number 2 field, the walking track at the back of the school and in the middle of the Pearce quad.

Back in class, we graphed our results then compared them with the official Metservice readings for Invercargill [which are taken at the airport].

Our next tasks involve processing our data, explaining our findings and making some conclusions relating back to the original aim of the research.



Media Studies

In 2020, Media Studies students developed their understanding of media concepts and how to apply them in a practical context, as well as adapting to a whole new way of learning – online through Teams.

At Level 1, students learnt about how meaning is created within film and how individuals interact with different types of social media like Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat and YouTube. They created films that were 'fake news broadcasts' looking into what happened to missing students at Southland Boys'.

In Level 2, students investigated how narrative and representation is created and developed in the media. Their brief for their short film was to look at the 'day in the life' of a character. This produced a range of interesting and innovative ideas from a 'fake robbery' to taking the wrong briefcase and finally working out what is in the back room in Mr Ward's classroom.

The Level 3 students showed understanding of how a television programme can be viewed through a number of different perspectives and examined the development of binge watching and streaming in the media. 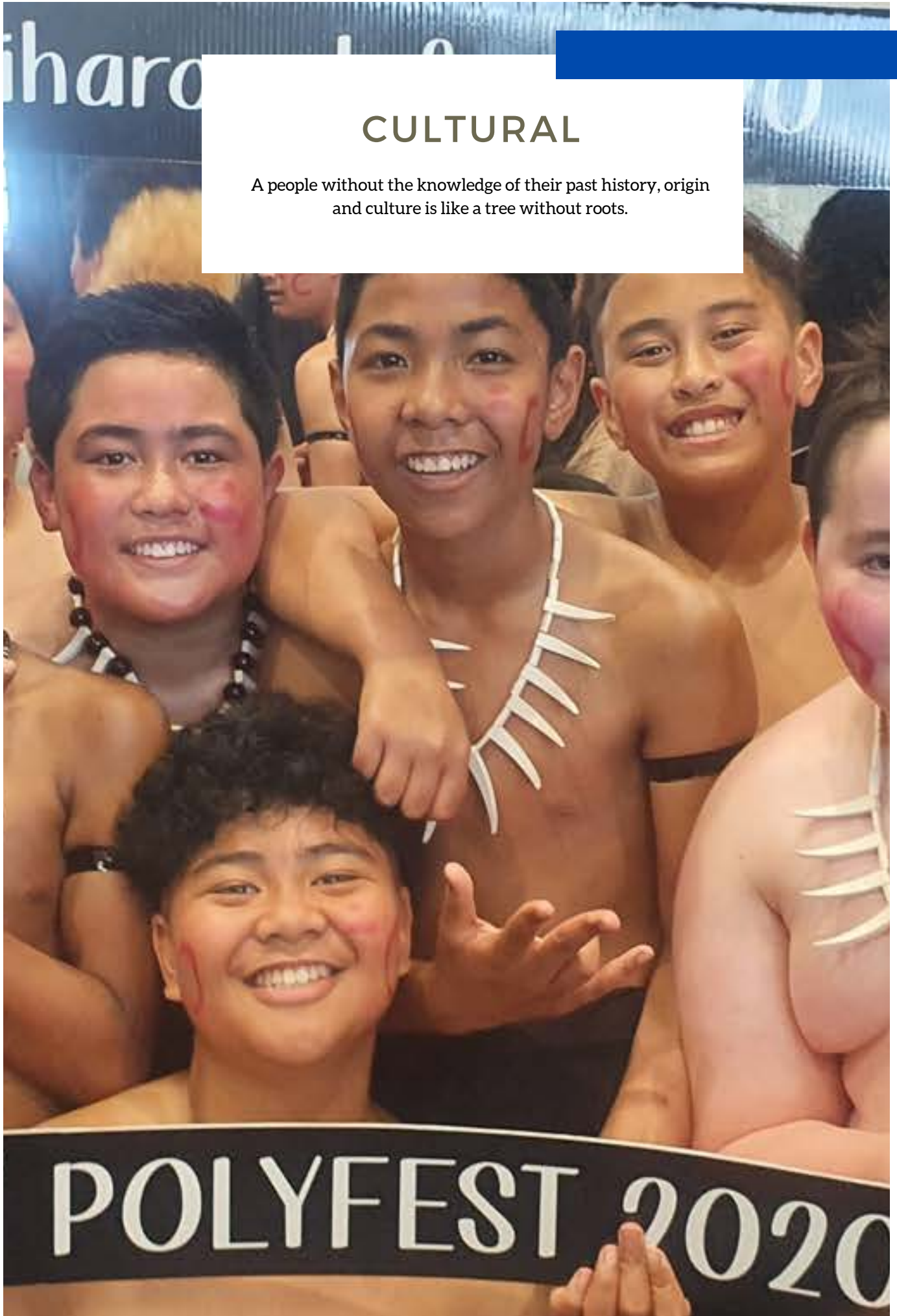
The skills and dedication of the students this year was impressive as well as their ability to work collaboratively and to problem solve.

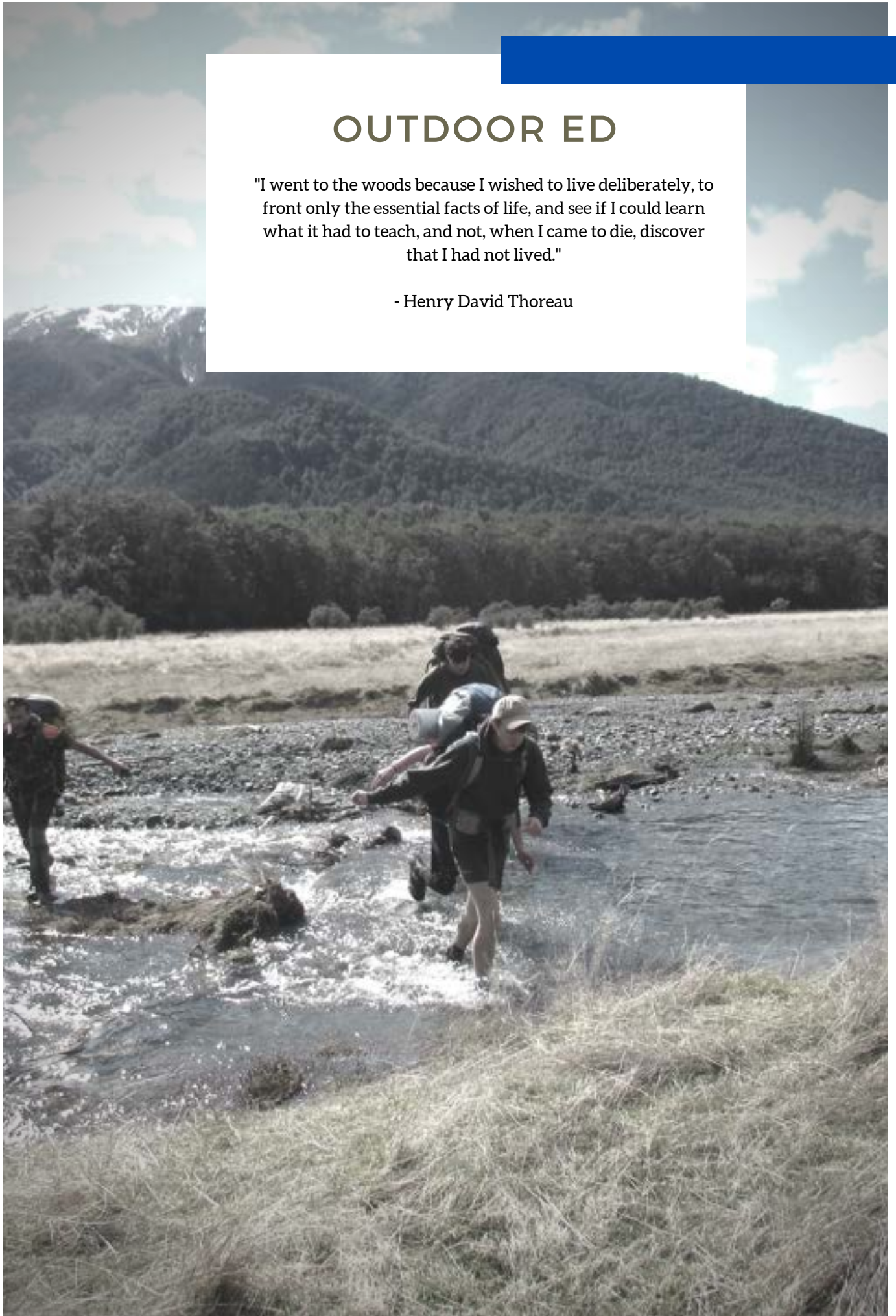

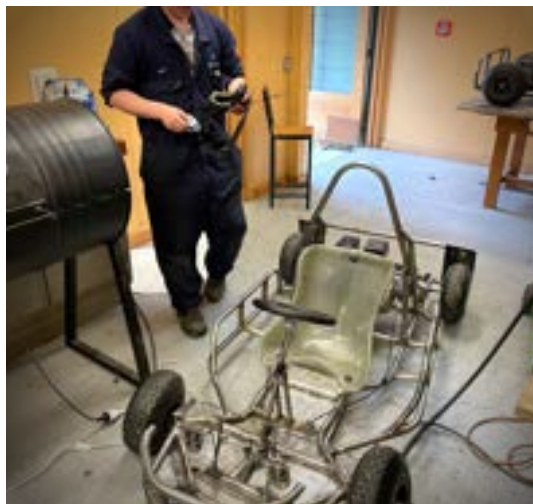
Grass Karts

Lockdown



2020 is a year that New Zealand, and in fact the World, will never forget. A worldwide pandemic status for 'Covid 19' Coronavirus was declared on March 12, by the World Health Organisation.

New Zealand reported its first case of Corona Virus on 28 February, and the NZ borders were closed to all but NZ citizens on March 19.

Level 4 Lockdown began just before midnight on 25 March. Southland Boys' High School was closed, along with all schools in New Zealand. Everything was locked up and even staff were not allowed to set foot on school grounds. The school had only been locked down twice before, in the 1918 influenza pandemic and the 1948 Polio pandemic. Teachers and staff had to work from home, and the internet became an invaluable way of connecting to students, where this was available. For those who did not have access to this, work was couriered to students, and parents became 'Teachers'.

Level 3, announced on 1 May, saw students of essential workers only, being allowed back at school. A few staff supervised these students, who still worked online in small groups, practicing social distancing. Most Teachers and Administration Staff still worked from home at this level.

Level 2 was announced to begin on May 14, with Schools opening fully on May 18. Washing/ sanitising hands and workspaces regularly, became the new norm.

The following is a glimpse of what our boys did to fill their time and extend their 'distance learning'.

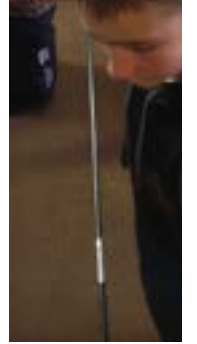
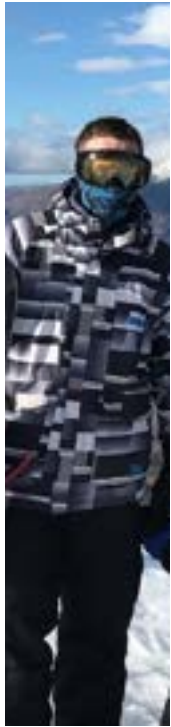

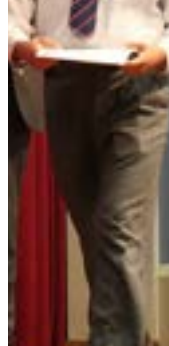
Isolation has been pretty good for me so far; I have had the time to practise my rugby and basketball which keeps me fit at the same time.

I have been riding my push bike and practising my jumps and my dad and older brother built me a bike track to practise on also. I have also been riding my motorbike with my brothers.





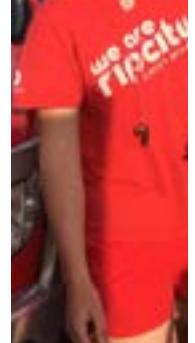

1st V Report

With a mixture of experience and youth and plenty of talent, the team looked at having a successful season in the Friday Night School League, aiming to reclaim the crown they lost the previous year.

Playing in the Men's A Grade was also part of the expectation, and this provided an early amount of games to build up to, before the dreaded covid lockdown.

Having old boy Zac Williams on board to help with coaching, gave the team a fresh taste and pathway to begin the season. With some players shuffling round for the Tuesday and Friday competitions, it allowed the players plenty of court time during the season.

The highlights for the Men's grade was the tantalizing 67-65 win over JHC, with Alex hitting two free-throws with 2 seconds on the clock. Another notable win was beating Rip City [eventual winners], and being only one of two teams to have beaten them in the league. The team eventually finished 4th in Southland. With no official tournament, it was down to a one-off qualifying game vs Otago Boys - which we started well in, got within 3 points in the third quarter, but unfortunately ran out of steam, going down 103-77. Alex stepped up, scoring 31 points.

The Interschool vs Kings was the only one played in 2020. This game was for the taking and SBHS started well, in the hunt for a reversal of last year's result in Dunedin. Experienced third year veterans Alex and Ben had massive games but with a lack of big game experience across the court, it was KHS who prevailed 93-84. It was a great game, played with a lot of heart and a good learning curve for the younger players.

The school competition saw SBHS only drop one game [70-75 to JHC] and having some big wins along the way versus Aparima [105-71], JHC 2nd V [94-40], SBHS 2nd V [89-53], Aurora [89-54], CSC [108-50] and Verdon [77-69]. A notable result was the big win over last year's champs Wakatipu [101-68] - some payback for the final in 2019.

Going in as underdogs to JHC, it was always going to be a tough ask. But with Mack Raines and Taine both fouling out in the fourth, momentum swung back to JHC. 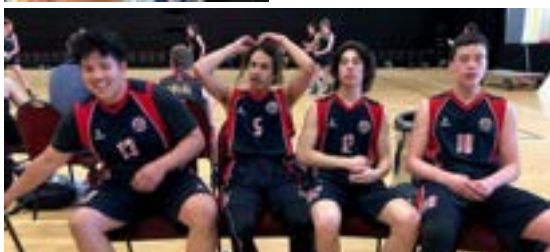

217 was going to be a mammoth effort to chase for the Shirley Boys' High and towards the end it got very close with one of the Shirley Boys hitting a very impressive 100 and putting Shirley in the box seat. But Alec Mathieson and Blair McKenzie stood up as senior seamers and controlled the game towards the end and leaving Shirley Boys 17 runs short and leaving Southland Boys with the first innings win.

SBHS vs King's High School

A delayed start due to a bit of rough groundsmanship meant that the first day was shortened, that being said, the boys were still rearing to bury the Lions on their home turf. The toss was lost, and we were sent into bat, the slightly moist pitch paid dividends early with us losing an early wicket. The boys then resettled and started to build some partnerships through the top to middle order getting through to 134/5 before we were reduced in quick succession to 145/8, eventually finishing the first innings on 165. After the tail did not wag with the bat the pace attack was fired up, this showed with us taking an early wicket. The rest of the day played out with our boys picking up wickets just as Kings were starting to build partnerships. A very competitive days play finished with Kings 107/5.

The next morning brought with it sunshine and play started on time. Kings came out swinging, looking to advance the game, which initially worked for them but as always, we fought back and as they lost the 8th wicket, Kings declared. This gave Southland Boys a first innings lead of 21. With five hours of play left in the match the plan was to bat for three of them and allow enough time to bowl Kings out. This plan was scuttled by Southland Boys losing wickets consistently on their way to 134/10. A thrilling last couple of hours was left with Kings requiring 155 in roughly two hours. Once again, the boys struck early having kings 1/1, the match was starting to head towards a Southland Boys outright when we had Kings 94/5 but as they saw the match fading away, they batted the hatches and blocked out for the draw. The result being a first innings win to Southland Boys' High School in a thrilling encounter.

SBHS vs Otago Boys' High School

The Otago Boys' High interschool hosted at Southland Boys' High was the last interschool for a large number of our 1st XI senior players who were looking to stamp their name on the school's cricket Honours board. With rain scheduled to affect the first and

second days play we knew we would have to put in a huge effort to gain a result. The lads got off to a great start by winning the toss and electing to bat. Young opening batsman Lachlan Nimmo and captain Brayden Thomas knew they had key roles in seeing off the strong pace bowling attack of Otago Boys and setting us up for a defendable total. Lachie's job for the day was to see off the opening bowlers and get the more confident run scorer Brayden Thomas on strike, and that's just what he did. Lachie managed to score a gritty 16 runs off 161 balls which was exactly what the team needed. His partner at the other end also managed to pull off an outstanding opening knock of 74 runs off 180 balls including nine 4s and three 6s. The team then struggled to regain their dominance and wickets started to fall. Batsman Jed Mockford got a good start to his innings hitting 24 runs and tried to get the team back into a good position to finish their innings. A great ending partnership of 40 runs between Jake Kura-Wharepouri and Alec Mathieson was crucial in setting a defendable total for Southland Boys High and they ended up 203/10 off 63.4 overs, which was definitely defendable.

After Southland Boys' High set a respectable total, the bowlers had to try knock over the strong top order of the Otago Boys' team and set themselves up for a strong second day. After a well fought day in the field Southland Boys' managed to take 8 wickets for 127 runs off 45 overs. With 3 wickets to opening bowler Alec Mathieson, 2 wickets to Ian De Reuck, and a single wicket each to Aaron Hart, Blair McKenzie and Jackson Ronald, Southland Boys' would return to day two with a convincing advantage over Otago Boys and with a first innings win almost in their hands. Sadly, a night of rain stopped Southland Boys short of a potential victory over their rivals. The day was called off without any play and the interschool was over.

They were always ahead of the required run rate with a display of attacking batsmanship. Standout was Brayden Thomas [51] followed by a quick fire 68 by Benji Culhane. Josh McCarthy, the recipient of a Willows Scholarship to Matfen, bowled a fine spell and was unlucky not to gain a wicket, while Jack Mockford completed a good double taking 3 for 47. Otago / Southland Football Tournament

Another penalty shoot-out was on its way with a bit of added spice this time round given that it was local bragging rights on the line. We managed to get on top of Hargest and win 4-2 on penalties which assured a huge celebration post-match. This result gave us the 3rd spot in the tournament which exceeded our pre-tournament goal and expectations.

Hockey

In a year like no other for sport in Southland and New Zealand, Hockey managed to survive. Unlike other sporting codes Hockey at a school level had a relatively “normal” length season which still ended with a Premier Tournament to compete in. Player numbers in the sport at Southland Boys’ High School remained at a healthy level with 5 teams taking part in Southland wide competitions.

We had three of the five teams competing on a Monday night in the Secondary School League, a junior team competing in the Year 7/8 league on a Thursday and the SBHS 1st XI competing in the Division 1 Hockey Southland Men’s League on Fridays. This meant that our boys and coaches were busy for most days of the week between May and September in what was a very disrupted sporting year.

Hockey 1st XI

The GOATS in 2020 were at full strength and maturity, all primed and ready for a massive season of Hockey. Very achievable goals had been set by senior players and management for the season ending tournament, the Rankin Cup – all we had to do was get there!

To best prepare themselves for the Rankin Cup, the GOATS needed to be up against strong competition and so entered the Hockey Southland Division 1 Men’s League. With limited travel options there was only one traditional interschool this year. Against national champions King’s High a loss of 5 – 1 wasn’t a bad result and could have been worse if not for our goal keeper Brayden Thomas, who got plenty of work against a strong King’s striking line.

Tournament Week - South Island Hockey Premiership Tournament

With travel limited but a real demand for tournament hockey to take place, Hockey NZ and Secondary School Sport NZ still ran tournament week, but only in regions. As a result, the GOATS left Invercargill at tournament week to play in Christchurch for the second year running. This time no North Island Schools, only the top 12 ranked in the South Island would compete. This included Kings HS and Timaru BHS [Gold and Silver medalists at the Rankin Cup], St. Bedes and John McGlashan [Gold and Silver medalists at the 2019 India Shield].

This tournament was to be the most competitive in the country that week. The draw saw the 12 teams put into 2 pools of 6 with the teams ranked 1 – 6 at the end of pool play and a playoff against the other pool on the final day. Our pool consisted of Kings, St. Andrews, Christ College, Otago Boys' High School, and Burnside High School. Day One was to be forever known as "Hell Day". This was because of the time frame the games were set in and who the GOATS had to play. A very old and skilled St. Andrew's XI was first. Despite St. Andrew's players having obvious skill, our GOATS did what they do best and played consistently across all 4 quarters. When Benji Culhane had slotted his third goal a score line of 3 - 2 saw a boil-over upset. This result not only pleased the many Southland supporters but also the locals. This set us up for the week and gave the GOATS huge confidence to go into the game against undefeated national champions King's High School in 2 hours time. We came out firing, but early uncharacteristic mistakes saw 2 soft goals scored. In the 3rd quarter Ben Symon, who had worked hard all day and the resulting week, was in the right position and absolutely smashed one passed the King's Goalie. Unfortunately, despite a few more chances slipping by, an eventual loss of 4 - 1 would result.

Day 2 and a game against old foes OBHS who, to be fair, have had the better of the GOATS for a long time. But feeling like we were the older stronger side, especially after the STAC result, it was really anyone's game. Venue for the battle would be Marist [St.Bedes] in the rain. This made conditions even more difficult not just for the players but also the umpires, who also struggled to see much through the rainy conditions. Again, this game came down to a couple of mistakes in a couple of minutes early in the game. The 4 - 1 result was not a true reflection of how it was played. For the Old boys on the side line and assistant coach Cody McKenzie in the dug out redemption was what was called for and it sure did happen, with some powerful drag flicking from Blair McKenzie, 2 penalty stroke saves by Brayden and arguably the best goal in 2020 from Max Milne. The 4 - 1 score line went in favor of the GOATS. The win meant that a bronze medal playoff was possible but required a win [another upset] over current second placed in Pool A - Christ's College.

Day 4 arrived the sun came out again and so did the GOATS all except our injured co-captain Benji, whose knee injury was too bad to go on. He would disappointingly spend his last tournament as a GOAT supporting his troops from the dugout. Sport Southland have noticed a huge drop off in numbers participating at primary, intermediate and secondary levels in cross country events. Other researchers have indicated fun-run and participation based options, seem to be successful methods to increase engagement, improve enjoyment and participation.
