As we end the school year for 2021 and celebrate the achievements of your sons, on behalf of the Board, I would like to thank you for your continued support for our school and staff during what has most definitely been a challenging year.

The Board has met 10 times this year, including 3 online meetings, to ensure that school can continue to operate in a safe and effective way. Thank you to fellow Board members, Sarah Brown, Charlene Withy, Cam Froude, Emma Smaill, Paul Stirling, former Staff representative Warren Ruwhiu and current staff rep Leon Dunn, Outgoing student rep 2021 Jackson Ronald and in coming student rep Andrew Kennedy. You give up so much of your time and travel to come to, at times, hastily arranged last minute meetings to discuss urgent matters and I appreciate your support, guidance and awhi.

The Board is extremely grateful to the staff at Southland Boys' High School. The professionalism of the Rector, Senior Management team, and all staff at school and Hostel Manager, Sue Mills and staff, is evident as they have continued to put students at the centre of all their decisions. This year the Board has continued to operate with probity, in trying financial times, to ensure that SBHS is resourced with staff and services that provide a 21st century education teaching young men the critical thinking skills they require for their futures.

The Board has invested in a complete staffroom upgrade, classroom refurbishments and upgrades in Herbert block, completion of the Turf on Queens drive, painting of the cricket pavilion, and our biggest investment - roofing. Whilst we admire our historic blocks the sheer cost of re-roofing Pearce block in Welsh slate tile, as required by the Historic places' classification, is eye watering. We have roofing all over the school in need of watertight solutions and the architectural styles of building additions since 1940 have created a unique set of problems and our property management team at Southern Quantity Surveyors are continually working on ways to identify solutions that are effective at keeping the water out whilst remaining cost effective.

In curriculum we have continued our investment in



resources and staffing. One of these is Robotics, where there has been a large increase in the number of students choosing this as an option due to an excellent teaching programme developed for young men and the world of technology they inhabit. We have purchased new technology for our Junior Technology classes and in 2022 students will have access to laser cutters, 3D printers and 3D pens. The

Wi-Fi and server upgrades that the Board invested in two years ago have allowed continued improved connectivity around the school site and we are in the process of upgrading the surface pro laptops used by students and currently housed in COWS (computers on wheels docking stations) at different sites around the school for classes to book and use.

We are very proud to have been able to build a new Health and Wellbeing suite that provides Health, Counselling, and external agency support spaces for boys to access wellbeing support. This space is invaluable for providing a safe and secure place for students to have appropriate support for their mental and physical wellbeing.

The Board continues to fund extra teachers and staffing, and of some pride is staffing for the Intervention space which has led to another year of improvement in stand down and suspension rates. Across all year levels there has been a 5% reduction however the improvement from 96 standdowns in 2020 to 40 in 2021 is a 40% reduction and at years 9 and 10 it is just as dramatic with a 43% reduction on the previous year standdowns. This is an indication that the Intervention space we are investing in is making a difference and boys are able to take time out, reinforce strategies and return to classrooms with skills learnt in managing their own behaviour. This is an excellent improvement attributable to all staff who have developed their capability in relation to management of classroom behaviour, and of a pastoral care system that puts students, Whanau, and community support agencies at the centre instead of punitive withdrawals and standdowns, suspensions and exclusions which don't provide any effective solutions and create future issues for our entire community.

Our Teaching and learning targets in the Strategic plan continue to see increases in Merit and Excellence endorsements in the 2020 NCEA results and overall pass rates across all three NCEA levels also increased. NCEA Level one saw an increase of 18% in excellence

and 31% at Merit levels.

At NCEA Level two Merit and Excellence levels had smaller increases but the noticeable result for this year group was a 65% increase in pass rates from the previous year. We will be targeting some professional development in 2022 that will focus on a culturally responsive curriculum delivery with high expectations and more targeted improvements.

Our students continue to show their resilience, grit, determination, and ability to adapt to a new normal that the rest of us are still grappling with.

Outstanding examples of students who represent the very best of our school values are students like Kaylin Goodall, winning the Southland 2021 Lion Foundation Young Enterprise Scheme, others like the SBHS Career navigator students, who were a part of a clean-up at Greenpoint Domain with the Dingle foundation in October 2021, and Year 8 student, Poliko Faalalia, who received the 2021 Year 8 Invercargill North Rotary Youth Merit award for being a great leader and a hard worker.

Ka mau te wehi! We are proud of you and your Whanau will be even more so as the values they have taught you resonate through your actions at school. Across our school we have so many outstanding examples of young men that show they can rise above adversity and achieve their goals.

Our students remind us that we must always strive to do better to develop the best educational, social, and pastoral care supports during their short time in our school. We look forward to meeting with you kanohi kitea – face to face in 2022.

OLD BOYS ASSOCIATION

First, some historical information. Southland Boy's High School opened to the public in 1881 thus presently the school is in its 140th year of operation. The Southlandian was first published in 1902 with the first Old Boys' Association function being held in February 1903. The dinner reads as being a grand occasion with numerous toasts and many fine comments being made about the 'Old School' over walnuts and wine.

With such a history behind us the importance of the role the Old Boys' Association has is not lost on our present committee. We do continue to make good progress improving connectivity amongst Old Boys.

The Old Boys' Association Committee has a meeting once every three months. Meeting business has been focused on supporting Ken Bowie in becoming School Patron, the digitalization of the School Museum collection, promoting Old Boys meetings or 'catch ups' in centers outside Invercargill and supporting the Boyd Creek Lodge.

It was pleasing to have Ken Bowie recognized as the School Patron at the senior prize giving in December last year. Ken has been a dedicated Old Boy for over 30 years and thoroughly deserves the recognition of his efforts that he has received.

The present building in which the Museum collection is stored has some earthquake issues. Should there be a need to shift cataloguing the collection items is now very important. We also want to capture the knowledge of the items held by Lynley Dear, our archivist. It is pleasing to note that at the time of writing a professional museum activist has been contracted to commence work in late August.

Branch meetings have been held in Auckland, Christchurch and the Wakatipu Basin (Arrowtown) with the Dunedin branch planning another muster for September. All meetings held were positive occasions. The Arrowtown meeting was very heartening. It was their first meeting and 36 attended.

The Boyd Creek Lodge was built from funds resulting from the School Centennial Celebrations. The Lodge is found off the road between Te Anau and Milford Sound. While ownership of the Lodge is now in the hands of



the school the Old Boys' Association Committee is actively supporting the Lodge as it is able.

School Patron and committee man Ken Bowie's interesting newsletters, social media, branch 'catch ups' and the availability of the Southlandian online have all ensured greater connectivity amongst Old Boys. We have had an increase in the number of financial members and active email addresses from the last year. Presently we have 156 financial members, 66 Life Members, 780 email addresses. As a committee we clearly have a desire to increase all of these numbers. Of particular interest has been the number of unique visitors to the online Southlandians. We have had 4514 different email addresses make a connection to the site!

The financial report indicates that the Old Boys' Association is financially sound however it could not be said we are in a strong position. Additional to our main support of the school that being the Dux and Proxime Accessit Scholarships there are many areas in which we could further support the school if we had the means. For example, there are projects such as the museum, school pavilion, Boyd Creek Lodge and hostel. We are grateful for the two donations we received within the last 12 months and to the financial members for their support.

The Association's Treasurers' Trevor and Reece Oliver and School Executive Officer Jo Keary have continued to work efficiently and accurately as a team with our financial business. I thank you for your sterling efforts. My thanks also to Brendan Copeland for his work as our secretary.

The Association Committee continues to personally support the School Museum and Archivist Lynley Dear. The cataloguing of collection items and the capturing of Lynley's knowledge are exciting developments for the longevity of our museum. Once we have our museum collection on record, we will look at the possibilities of online availability. We are extremely grateful to Lynley for her conscientious and exacting efforts of recording, enhancing and sharing the history and heritage of our school.

To the future - I consider the continued development and building of Old Boys branches in centers throughout New Zealand should continue to be a focus. We have received enquiries for a 'catch up meeting

from Old Boys living in Wellington. We should pursue this interest. The securing of the museum's location and collection items deserves the Association's continuing support. The Boyd Creek Lodge should remain 'on the radar' and we should support the school's efforts to refurbish this facility. The increase in financial members is heartening, hopefully it will continue. As our financial capability improves, we can further support the school.

The following Old Boys have become the branch co-ordinators for our catch ups – Murray Galbraith and John McLennan (Auckland), Brian Thompson and Keith Laidlaw (Christchurch), Peter Sinclair (Dunedin) and Barry Withington (Wakatipu). I thank them for their valuable support.

On behalf of the Old Boys' Association, I would like to thank the Rector Simon Coe, the teaching staff,

the administration staff, and caretaking staff for their willingness to support us. The positive relationship we all share makes the Old Boys feel a real part of the school.

I would also like to thank Ken Bowie for his excellent newsletters and media work, and Wayne Hulls for his special role as the Association Database manager.

Our other current committee men are Bevan McNaughton, John Low, Rowly Currie, Neill Blackmore, Russell Read, Roger Wilson and Peter Redpath. To you all my sincere thanks for your involvement and support. At this AGM we will be confirming the appointment to our Committee of current SBHS teacher Ryan Marshall, plus all the above-mentioned Branch Co-ordinators. This will give us more national presence and support, and we welcome their involvement in Old Boy activities.


FROM THE ARCHIVES

ARCHIVIST

Lynley Dear

This year a start has been made on the Digitisation of our Museum. This huge task is being sponsored by our very loyal and supportive SBHS Old Boys. Initially a process called 'Scoping' had to take place, and this began over a period of days, by the archivist and a professional expert, Paula Haines Bellamy. She will return at a time as yet unspecified to do the actual Digitising, which will ensure a secure record of our precious and historic collection of objects, which tell the stories of the history of our school.

I have decided that in this report and subsequent reports, I'll look closely at some of those objects, which are significant to us and our school, which is now 140 years old. The Pearce Block of the Herbert St school will be 100 years old in 2026. So look forward to celebrations then!



SCHOOL BELL

The original school in Conon Street was designed in 1881 with a bell tower by early Invercargill architect, Burwell. However we know nothing of the original bell but in 1927 when the school had been one year in its Herbert Street building (the Pearce Block), Mr Pearce, the Rector, bought a bell from the Hanan family who had owned it for more than 50 years. It was made in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1862 for the barque The Star of Victoria. This new barque made her first trip from her home port of Launceston, Tasmania to Invercargill. After unloading her cargo of bluegum timber, she left on her return. While being towed across the harbour bar at the



mouth of the Oreti river, the cable parted. She drifted onto the rocks and became a total wreck on May 27th, 1864. The bell had a beautiful tone, audible throughout the school - but as you can see by the crack, it will never be heard again.

SCHOOL CREST

The School Crest, at the end of the main aisle, immediately dominates the view of those entering the Museum. It was hand made and donated to his old school by Robert Smart (3378) at school 1936-1938.



He studied art in Australia and England and served with the Royal NZ Air Force in the Pacific during World War II. The motto on the crest was chosen by Southland Boys' High School's first Rector, Mr G.W. Blanchflower, in 1881 and is shared by Southland Girls' High, which in those days shared the same school building. Mr Blanchflower also chose the colours Red, White and Blue, probably because those were the colours of the British flag. The School Crest or Logo is in the form of a shield, above which is a depiction of the lamp of knowledge. The three segments show the Southern Cross constellation, a rugby ball representing the School's sporting activities and what is possibly a stylised Southern Rata flower.




FOUNDATION STONE

The foundation stone for the Herbert Street school was laid by:

The Education Minister was presented with this silver commemorative trowel on the day the Foundation Stone was laid. Amazingly the silver trowel, which is an iconic object for the school, was lost and came back to us only because it was hit by a rotary hoe when a man was gardening in Kaitaia, in the far north of New Zealand! He returned it to us in astonishingly good condition so now it is among our precious historic icons. No doubt it will be made use of in a ceremony when in 2026 we celebrate 100 years in Herbert St.

Acceptance: our ability to accept there are some things in life we cannot control.

Adaptability: new ways to communicate, korero

‘Whāia te mātauranga hei oranga mō koutou.

Seek after learning for the sake of your wellbeing.’

Ka pai for all the hard mahi.

We have noticed, over the past 12 months, an increase in students who are seeking help or wanting to korero (talk) about some of their concerns or fears. Remembering that our three most predominant feelings are love, fear and hurt. From fear and hurt come, anxiety, anger, uncertainty, worry, feelings of helplessness and sadness. Many of these feelings arise because of things that are out of our control. If you have noticed changes in your son’s behaviours, seek help, talk with other parents or your GP, talk with us we are there to help and support. Our kids often do not know or cannot say exactly what they are feeling so they will show us in their behaviours.



Ka pai to all our students who have reached out for support, acknowledged their own wellbeing and in some cases the wellbeing of others.

Wellbeing (Mental Health Awareness)

Awareness of our own and others wellbeing (Mental Health Awareness) has always been around, however, this year it has moved beyond just ‘thinking about it’ and into our homes, our living rooms, and social media platforms. Finally, we are having a korero (conversation) about our feelings, acknowledging that feelings/emotions are part of our human condition. We are not just a physical body, we have a complex makeup that consists of our family connections, spiritual connections, and our mental health connections.

Te Whare Tapa Wha (The Maori Health Model) stresses how these four pillars or cornerstones connect to make us who we are. If our whare stands tall on its four cornerstones, what extra stress do we put on the foundations when one is not functioning or out of balance? We pay lots of attention to our family and physical connections, not so much to our mental and spiritual connections. It is about us working towards developing a healthy balance between all four. Knowing ourselves, our strengths, our challenges, what we can change about ourselves or our environment, and what we need to accept, is the first step in feeling successful and okay.

**'Manaaki whenua. Manaaki tangata.
Haere whakamua.
Care for the land. Care for the people.
Go forward.'**

Success is not only about how much we have, what we own, what we do, or how powerful we are, it is about accepting who WE are, and feeling proud of all our achievements, no matter how big or small. It is about setting a goal and working hard to achieve it.

Failure is about learning; it is about using this opportunity to look at how we can restructure and do it better next time. Sean Fitzpatrick (Former All Blacks Captain) says [no one] "is going to deliver your dreams and aspirations ... on a plate. Achieving them means accepting [the] hard work". Success means 'being the best you can be'.

The Olympics put our mental health or wellbeing in the spotlight. Our athletes are stepping up and sharing their concerns, ordeals, and pressures they have experienced and the effects on their mental health.

Lisa Carrington sums this up: 'physical and mental aspects of achievement (no matter how small) go hand in hand'. We cannot reach our physical potential if we fail to recognize our mental potential. "Know the mental space you need to be in to successfully complete a task or project." Government, workplaces, and schools are focusing on how to promote safe working places with emphasis on our wellbeing.

Let us move forward into 2022 with hope, a vision for our futures and a willingness to meet challenges with renewed strength, resilience, and kindness to ourselves and each other.





While he expected they would do well, he felt the outcome was dependent on who the competition was; the event had a record number of 18 teams.


CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

In 2020 the SBHS Junior Team won the Southland Schools competition. The Y10 Team and the Senior

In 2021 the Junior and Senior Teams have represented SBHS at the John McGlashan, Otago Boys' and King's High Interschools. The Y10 team remain unbeaten. The Senior Team stalwarts of Hunter Jennings and Dylan Lee are in the NZ debating development teams.

In August SBHS was to host the Southland Regional Debating Competition. Unfortunately, this was cancelled due to the Level 2 Covid restrictions. In 2022 we plan to hold the Southland Competitions and defend the trophy won by the Y9 team in 2020. With that in mind we would welcome any student who wants to come to 4P at lunchtime and be apart of the debating group.

Being able to speak confidently is a skill that many of our students develop in Debating and leads onto entering other competitions for speech, such as the Rotary Speech competitions which has a monetary prize. Being able to confidently speak is an important skill for our Prefects and often our debaters leave school and go onto Law School or Politics.

Dylan Lee and Sam White have been lynch pins for the debating team over the last five years. Dylan is going to University next year to study Law and Sam has the potential to be in politics. Thank you both for everything you have done for debating at SBHS. We will miss you.

HEALTH AND PHYSICAL WELLBEING

During 2021 Health & Physical Wellbeing (HPW) had a strong focus on improving the overall wellbeing of student, especially their fitness levels. Classes were able to participate in a variety of skill development opportunities throughout the year, even with the interruptions of Lockdown.

In Year 9 and 10 HPW, Student Hubs covered a variety of topics in Health such as: Values of the School and in society / Drugs & Alcohol / Smoking / Diet & Nutrition / Fitness Awareness / Anatomy / Social Responsibility within Groups.

Health classes had many opportunities for group work, sharing ideas and providing chances for students to share knowledge/discuss topics within smaller groups.

In the practical part of HPW, topics ranged from: Fitness Testing / Badminton & Table Tennis Striking Skills / Volleyball & Basketball Skills / Turbo Touch / Athletics / Round the Park Running Programme, Foreign Games such as Tchokball, Handball and Viperball. As well as Traditional Maori Games such as Ki O Rahi and Tapu Ae.

Fitness Testing ensures students are tested and

challenged twice a year to improve their fitness levels. Students measure time, and record their fitness levels, all to help in the understanding of the limits of their physical strength. Goal Setting is used to allow students to set a realistic target to work towards.

Physical Fitness Tests include a Physical Strength assessment both for the upper body and lower body, measured by pull ups / press ups and an explosive vertical jump. Agility and speed are measured by a timed agility run. Aerobic Endurance is calculated by the Beep Test and YoYo Test, and finally flexibility is measured by a sit and reach hamstring test.

This helps determine a student's overall fitness in Term 2 & 4, gives teachers a great measuring tool and helps students to set goals and see their progress.

Students are also assessed on a variety of practical skills, and with many students taking Health & Physical Wellbeing at NCEA Level One, practical demonstration and the analysis of skills will gain student credits.

One of the Departments goals is the social development of our young men within a team environment. Developing and enhancing the interpersonal skills young students need these days, is an important focus point.

The Social Responsibility Model is an excellent way to continue to build their social skills, team work elements and demonstrating our school values, and incorporating our motto 'Not for school but for Life we are learning'. At Year 10, this unit also provides a platform for NCEA Material that is revisited at Year 11 HPW.

In the senior Physical Education courses many students achieved to a good level, gaining internal standards throughout the year. Many students enjoyed and excelled in the Practical Performance standards, gaining good grades in these practical standards. While students enjoyed the practical element of the Physical Education courses, the written component of levels 2 & 3 remains a challenge for some students. Having a combination of theory and practical standards is the key to a balanced course, with support and

MUSIC/PERFORMANCE

DRAMA

A Busy, Bold and Brilliant Year

Drama started the year with a bang participating in the 'Sheilah Winn Shakespeare Festival', hosted by Southland Girls' High School. For this we presented a 15-minute scene from Shakespeare's bloody and violent tragedy 'Titus Andronicus', winning an award for best magic moment. The students threw themselves into this work with particularly gleeful performances from Nash Creedy as the vengeful Titus, Tobias Armstrong as the aghast Emperor, Josh Keen as the psychotic Aaron, and a closing speech delivered with stately passion from Riley Ford and Sam White. Not to be forgotten were our "female" leads; Will Yeo's plotting Tamora, and Brodie Massie's damaged Lavinia.

The year also saw the production of the musical 'Spamalot' a joint effort from the whole department of Performing Arts and Southland Girl's High School. Full productions allow students the opportunities to experience the magic and reality of working onstage and off. We were lucky enough to use Centre Stage as a venue and provide the students with a real-world experience akin to the expectations of professional productions.

The year 11 and 12 senior drama class staged short Melodramas which they performed for a year 8 Drama class. This was an opportunity for both classes to learn about this entertaining historical theatre form and gain experience of live theatre. JP Velghe's damsels in distress leapt about the stage, as Caleb Peseta's villain laughed manically for his missed rent money.

We were also able to have the Theatre Technologies class working on show and want to thank Brad Whitaker for stepping up and helping to design and operate the lights.

We hope the production was able to provide a lighthearted break from some of the stresses of life to the audience. Allowing them to remember to try to, as one of the more famous songs from the show says, "always look on the bright side of life".

ROBOTICS

A new option subject, Robotics, was introduced to Year 10 students for 2021. In this course, students learn two

Expanding on the programming and building activities Year 9 students undertake for their Robotics option course, students at Year 10 use metal components to fashion robots for a variety of challenges.

SCIENCE

Once again, the school year was impacted by Covid 19.

Distant learning was again the order of business for our students in 2021 and a lowering by the Ministry of Education NCEA levels also had an impact on the engagement of students.

To their credit our science students continued to work on and have found success, especially with the internal components of many of the courses offered.

Student external successes in terms of awards were also detrimentally impacted by the second national lockdown. Among the impacts was the cancellation of 2 major events for the school - the Southland Secondary School Science Fair and Rotary Science Scholarship which will hopefully return in 2022.

SENIOR SCIENCE

Senior Sciences at Southland Boys' High School saw sustained growth in student numbers.

The area of Agriculture saw a largest increase with many students seeing the Primary ITO trades academy as a viable vocational pathway. We were fortunate in this area to have 3 students selected for further exclusive farm placements at Smedley Academy (Napier) and Jeff Farm (West Otago).

Despite the lockdown impacting the latter part of 2021, our senior students did manage some off-site visits. Our Level 3 Biology students attended a 3-day camp in Dunedin to gather viable data for an internal standard.

Junior Science

Testing at a junior Science level has only occurred once this year and results appear to be like previous years verifying our continued commitment to mixed ability classes in our junior and level 1 science classes. Local contexts continue to increase our student engagement and there is work being done within the Faculty aligning our current units of work to the new NCEA changes scheduled for 2023.

A new option has been included in 2022 at a year 9 level for students with inquisitive minds and like experimenting which will hopefully lead onto more interest in the Southland Science Fair by our senior students.

Health and Safety Regulations specifically regarding Secondary School Laboratories and Workspaces have generated new Hazard Plans and a Hazard Register. The school successfully operates and maintains an up to date database of hazardous substances and hazards associated with Science Laboratory and associated science activities. We now look to develop a method to deal with extreme student behaviour in a practical laboratory setting and how we can manage this under the current Health and Safety procedures developed in 2021.

STAFF CHANGES

This year we farewell Julia Shannon from the faculty. During her time with the faculty she has used her vast experience to reshape Biology and senior science catering to the needs of students in front of her. She will no doubt continue to develop this skill while taking up a position of learning support co-ordinator at SBHS. We wish her all the best.

Mr Shaun Howarth departed towards the end of term 3 to pursue other interests and complete additional training. His classes have been taken over by Ms

Dipeeka Goswami who brings expertise in the teaching of Senior physics and general science to our faculty.

Awards

As previously stated 2021 has had a grave impact on the awards available and achieved by our senior students.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

It has been a busy year in the Social Science department with two new staff joining us in 2021.

Hattie de Vries is the new HoF of Social Science and has come to us from the North Island via Verdon College. She is an experienced Geography and Social Studies teacher and will oversee implementing the new Social Science Curriculum, the Aotearoa New Zealand History Curriculum and the NCEA changes.

Michelle Roberts joined us from Lochiel school where she has been teaching Year 8 students for many years. She is a great addition to our department bringing skills in teaching literacy and differentiated learning. Michelle has enjoyed working with high school students.

This year is the last year that we will have Bob Ward as our colleague. Bob will retire at the end of the year after more than 25 years of service to the school. Bob was also a student at Southland Boys' High so has a very long association with the school. His presence, knowledge and enthusiasm will be sorely missed by all of us.

Students have continued to excel in the department and have been provided with a variety of experiences. We were very proud of two of our Year 10 Social Studies teams that made the top 10 in an online current events quiz that was run throughout New Zealand at the end of October. Three of our teams battled for the title of 2021 Lion Foundation Young Enterprise (YES) Southland Company of the Year. Kaylin Goodall's company The Sill won the competition. Kaylin has designed a hydroponic kit for people to grow their own plants at home.

Southland Boys' High School teams also took out Excellence Awards. Ice Rival, (Carter Ferguson, Junior Kaiser, Luke Hamblin and Hayden Jones) won an excellence award for Retail, Trade and Online Business. The team developed a product to spray on your car windscreens to clear the screen of ice on frosty Southland mornings. The Sill also won an excellence award for Primary Industries. This win has qualified Kaylin to enter the national competition in Wellington. It is the first time one of our students has won this prestigious award.

The annual Year 13 trip to Queenstown had to be cancelled due to Covid, to great disappointment.

In Social Studies the year 10's had the opportunity to do some fieldwork in Queens Park and around the school for the sustainability topic and they produced some interesting research.

Year 13 History students greatly enjoyed learning about some recent New Zealand history through examining the David Bain case through an historical lens.


The BP Challenge was once again a roaring success for the department. Over 60 Commerce students from year 10 and year 11 took part in this one-of-a-kind, hands-on learning event. Students developed their skills, got in front of businesspeople, and learned more about how a good business works.

In Media Studies at Level 1 students learnt about how meaning is created within film and how individuals interact with different types of social media. They created films that were either 'fake news broadcasts', an urban legend or an event that happened within five minutes.

One group even discovered through their superior journalism techniques who the mystery pool pooper was. Other groups were witness to some terrible incidents like a murder in the woods and scooter versus elderly lady.

In the level 2 course students' brief for their short film was to look at the 'day in the life' of a character. This produced a range of interesting and innovative ideas from a 'fake robbery', to "how Blake became the new rector". Students investigated how narrative and representation is created in Wentworth.

The Level 3 Media class produced a silent horror. They produced films with compelling narratives and thoughtful production values looking at the death of a brother, a killer clown and the impact of domestic violence.




Burgess looked to up the tempo and was the first to go for a well struck 75. Hart continued on and played some exquisite shots. He entered the nineties and was happy to take singles. He edged his way to a hundred and was rewarded for a superb innings when he passed a great milestone in interschool cricket 100 runs. Eventually being dismissed


Day Two



The focus all week had been winning the contact area and to a man the team were great in this area often gaining vital turnovers.



To Lucy, you have come straight into the hostel with ease and help out so much, making Matron's life that bit more easier. Mr Coe thank you for your continual support here and over at school.
