E ngā mana, e ngā reo, e ngā iwi, tena koutou katoa.

On behalf of the School Board I would like to say thank you, as we celebrate your sons and their outstanding efforts in upholding our values this year – o tātou uara and our standards – o tātou tikanga.

Our school motto is 'Non scholae sed vitae discimus' – Not for school but for life we are learning'. Not a difficult motto to live by really – as parents we recognise the importance of these words, and we can see the pathway our formative education gave us to support our dreams and aspirations for the future. For the leavers of 2022 – I hope you will continue to live by this motto, continue to uphold your mana and strive for continued excellence and effort above and beyond the norm.

What an extraordinary three years it has been – the ups and downs of lockdowns, restrictions, vaccinations and Covid infections. We started 2022 school year under the RED Covid Protection Framework. The senior management team had plan A, backed up by plan B and then plan 'close it down' if required. We just held our breath from March to July, worrying if we would be able to remain open, if we had enough staff to maintain a decent teaching programme, worrying about everyone's health, stress levels, how many boys would be at school the next day and what other delays or supply issues we would be up against. It has been challenging! But we got through it. We made it

to the first whole school assembly, the senior capping ceremony with parents and whānau in support and then the first opportunity since 2019 to hold House Cultural competitions! It was moving to be in the gym and to experience the school haka and school song in full flight after two years of not being able to do these very important brotherhood events.

I would like to thank Simon Coe, Rector, and his entire staff for their strength of character, and steadfast and unwavering dedication to not only the education of our sons but the emotional and physical wellbeing that came with keeping our school open. This was about connection to other human beings – if lockdown showed us anything it was that anxiety from parents passed to children, and increased mental health issues in schools. We know that our connection to others enables us to battle diseases, thrive and survive.

Research shows that people who take part in meaningful, productive and social activities generally live longer, have a sense of purpose and maintain a better mood. Senior management balanced this with education, and we saw the difference it made to the boys just being together – being connected to each other in person and not by Zoom, Teams, email or social media.

From the teaching staff to the administration and finance teams, library, canteen, Coldstream Hostel Matron and team, caretaker and grounds team, sports

administrators, cleaners, and pastoral care, learning support and counselling staff – every single valued staff member at Southland Boys' High School contributed to keeping school open and supporting your sons in learning for life.

The Board, once again, started its year off with online Team meetings – a necessity to keeping governance ticking over but it really wasn't business as usual. There are real complexities in developing a Strategic Plan online, meeting with the Education Review Office in between all of this, and ensuring an effective governance model is in place. For the outgoing Board, we achieved a couple of major pieces of work this year.

The first was the school's inaugural three-year Strategic Plan. This will come out to parents for consultation over the holiday period. It's truly a first for school – it reflects our commitment to *tātou herenga* which is 'to give all learners a high quality, culturally responsive, safe, seamless and inclusive education.' Our school values are aligned to Māori values that uphold the mana of Southland Boys' High School, of our students and of our place as a boys school in Aotearoa.

For the first time the eight school values are strengthened by the creation of foundation Maori values. The eight values sit under four Pou – like a pillar of strength that gives mana to those values and their standards.

Respect, Honesty and Compassion now sit under a Pou called *Manaakitanga*. The standard is still the same as it has always been, which is – to value all people, to tell the truth and to consider the feelings of others. A new value has been created to identify what the 'Boys' High way' is. The new value is 'Unity in Brotherhood' and its sits under the Pou of *Kotahitanga*. The standard it relates to is 'working together with pride and confidence to uplift and support your peers, school, whānau and your community.'

From the Strategic Plan are four sets of strategic priorities and then targets related to teaching, learning and pastoral care. Please keep your eye out for the email over the holidays and share your thoughts, as we value your input.

To the incoming Board – Emma Smaill, Chami Abeysinghe, Janine Hopcroft, Melissa Kean, Shaun

Fitzgibbon, Nick Brown and Simon Coe – I look forward to our next three years together and driving effective governance strategies from the Strategic Plan to meet our commitment to all learners.

Further property upgrades have continued around the school, including some repainting and grounds improvement at Coldstream Hostel. Uttley Block is undergoing some major work to provide proper ventilation as well as modern and welcoming additions to the walkway areas that will become teaching breakout spaces.

The library renovations are completed and with the final lot of furniture arriving over the term break it looks like a different room and it's being well utilised by students. Shortly Pearce Block will undergo a multi-million dollar re-roof in Welsh slate tiles thanks to the fast thinking of the Rector. In one 30 minute tour he was able to get support from the Ministry of Education's National Property Manager for projects that have been waiting 10 years for funding.

In closing I would like to thank the outgoing 2019-2022 Board members – it has been a really difficult time to be a school trustee and attempt to maintain governance business as usual. However, we have been financially prudent, and school has been supported in terms of staffing and resources to align with the targets of the Strategic Plan.

Sarah Brown, Cam Froude, Paul Stirling, Leon Dunn (staff rep) and Andrew Kennedy, (student rep), and long-time parent of the school, hostel management committee member and number one Rugby supporter Charlene Withy – thank you all for your unwavering dedication to Southland Boys' High School. We achieved so many things that I haven't even touched on, but I really am grateful to have spent this time in the trenches with you.

On behalf of Southland Boys High School, thank you for supporting our school and sharing your sons with us – for giving our team the opportunity to provide a pathway for the rest of their lives.

SCHOOL PATRON

As I commence writing this, I am reminded that it is almost two years since I was honoured by being appointed as Patron of Southland Boys' High School. Unfortunately, the disruption caused by Covid 19 has limited the opportunities for me to attend school activities, and meet with the young gentlemen who now occupy the same classrooms and sports grounds that I did 60 years ago.

However, I have managed to see a few events, such as interschool sports, debating, school choral competitions, inter-house cultural competitions, Year 7 school museum visits, and I follow the school Facebook page with great interest. Most of those posts, along with newspaper reports of students excelling in various other fields, I share on the Old Boys' Facebook page and in Old Boys' newsletters, which are emailed around New Zealand and the world. The school newsletters are also forwarded to Old Boys', so that they are informed of current events, the daily challenges, and life in general in their old school. Maybe they remember less sanitised versions of what they read?

So what do we see, or learn, by keeping in touch with current school affairs and activities?

Without wanting to sound like 'an old codger', there are some obvious changes to student life as we knew it, but much of it is superficial. For example, in the 1960's we had no computers or cellphones – that would have seemed like sci-fi back then. Most boys cycled to

school, and we had to wear caps outside the school gates. Only staff, visitors and prefects could use the front door. The cane was used for punishment. We had a shooting range beside the Pavilion, and the Rector lived in the Rectory – now the Alex Lindsay Music Suite. Assemblies were held daily, with a Bible reading and a hymn. We didn't have Year 7 and 8 pupils, or a school museum! And there have been curriculum changes. More noticeable is the increase in number of pupils, and teaching and administration staff.

I have seen the fire in your belly when doing the haka, or attacking on the sports field. I have heard your achievements at prizegiving, and seen your House competitiveness on Athletics Day,

On the other hand, little has changed. The uniform is basically the same, apart from the cap. Although there have been renovations, we still have the same character buildings, with the Pearce Block approaching the grand old age of 100 in 2026. The Pavilion, even older, still stands watch over the cricket pitches, and the recent upgrade by a well organised group of Old Boy tradesmen has given it a new lease on life.

The sounds of young men moving around the school between classes never changes, with the chatter, the sound of feet on floor (albeit more muffled on carpet



than on linoleum!), and the occasional stentorian bellow of the broken voice! Teachers continue to be challenged by pupils, but indeed rise to the occasion and instil knowledge in place of ignorance, as the young boy matures into the young man.

Very importantly, the school continues to uphold the traditions that commenced in 1881, albeit moving with the times when appropriate. This is at the core of what makes Southland Boys' High School a solid and supporting institution that in effect hasn't changed since I first walked through the gates in 1962.

Let me talk directly to the pupils – the future leaders and citizens of our communities and country.

You will often hear comments by adults who despair about the direction of today's youth, but it was the same for many in my day. 'Short back and sides' haircuts became crew cuts, or combed – back with 'Brylcreem' – or even worse, long and loose like the Beatles! 'The Swinging 60's' became associated with a liberal society, which challenged the norms of our parents in many ways. And now we are maligned by a younger generation which blames the post-war 'baby boomers' for many of today's societal ills! Who knows where you will lead us?

But has much changed outside the school gates over these years? The world seems in turmoil at present, after Covid 19; Putin's war in Ukraine; the political

fracas in so many western countries; and much race and religion inspired brutality in other countries around the world.

However, in the 1950/60's we had the Cold War, with nuclear weapons poised for action. There were the Asian Wars – Malaya, Korea and Vietnam, and the Cuba crisis. There was racial tension in many countries, and the polio epidemic. South Africa had apartheid, India had the caste system, and numerous political assassinations of Presidents and Prime Ministers occurred. Although, we did get to the moon! With so many world leaders behaving so badly, how can you, as future citizens, be inspired to follow them? Unless you wish to follow the example of Old Boy Garfield Todd, who became Prime Minister of Rhodesia, 1953/58 (now Zimbabwe), the answer is 'don't!'

I have seen the fire in your belly when doing the haka, or attacking on the sports field. I have seen dedication at the debating table, and in the artworks featured in the Southlandian. I have heard your achievements at prizegiving, seen your House competitiveness and colourful humour on Athletics Day, and witnessed your respect at school ANZAC Services.

You will be like many Old Boys' before you – maybe with dreams, aims, and plans – or maybe not. You will have to continue to work hard, keep your head high, and feet on the ground, but you will leave Southland Boys' High School well equipped to deal with the future, and make your own way in this world.

OLD BOYS' ASSOCIATION

This year, the Old Boys' Association has been focused on the Southland Boys' High School history book, the digitalization of the school museum collection, supporting and protecting Boyd Creek, and supporting the school where possible.

Association representatives, school Patron Ken Bowie and Jim Watson, are part of a History Book Committee developed to support author Lynley Dear in writing the history of Southland Boys' High School.

The committee was formed in November 2021. It is Lynley's hope that the book will be available for sale in two years when the School has been on site in Herbert Street for 100 years. Other committee members are Russell Dear, former Rector Ian Baldwin, and Rector Simon Coe. Further Old Boys' are to be involved in the promotion, sales and finances pertaining to the book.

The Old Boys' Association has received healthy financial support from the Southland Regional Heritage Committee. This funding has enabled the employment of a qualified archivist to digitalise the museum collection. Significant progress has been made in this regard over the recent school holidays. It is the hope that in time a virtual tour will be available around our museum.

Branch meetings have been held within the reporting period in Auckland, Christchurch, Wakatipu Basin, and Dunedin, with Wellington having their first start

up meeting. Reports from all meetings were very positive. The Association is grateful to Murray Galbraith (Auckland), Brian Thompson and Keith Laidlaw (Christchurch), Barry Withington (Wakatipu), Peter Sinclair (Dunedin) and Wayne Buckingham and Brent Anderson (Wellington) for their role in coordination.

The Boyd Creek Lodge remains on the Association's radar. Led by committee man Trevor Oliver, efforts are being made to legally secure the Lodge and its surrounding grounds. The Lodge remains a possible holiday accommodation between Milford Sound and Te Anau should any Old Boy wish to avail themselves.

Through having the Southlandian magazines online, the museum collection similarly available and the history of the school written in a book within the next two years, much of our school's history will be secure.

The financial report indicates that the Old Boys' Association is financially sound, seeing a gradual increase of income through increased subscriptions and voluntary donations. The traditional donations of the Dux and Proxime Accessit scholarships continued. The Association was pleased to fund the display cases in the school foyer for former Rector and Cricketer Jack Alabaster's cricket memorabilia.

The Association's Treasurers, Trevor and Reece Oliver, and School Administration Officer have continued to work efficiently and accurately as a team with our financial business. I thank you for your sterling efforts. My thanks also to Brendan Copeland for his work as our secretary.

The Association Committee continues to personally support the school museum and Archivist Lynley Dear. We are extremely grateful to Lynley for her conscientious and exacting efforts of recording, enhancing and sharing the history and heritage of our school. Through having the Southlandian magazines online, the museum collection similarly available and the history of the school written in a book within the next two years, much of our School's history will be secure.

On behalf of the Old Boys' Association, I would like to thank the Rector Simon Coe, the teaching staff, the administration staff, and caretaking staff for their willingness to support us. The positive relationship we mutually share makes the Old Boys' feel a real part of the school.

I would also like to thank Ken Bowie for his excellent newsletters and media work. Ken's efforts create interest amongst Old Boys' and brings them together. Wayne Hulls in his role of database Manager is the hub of the Association. He continues to build our database numbers and record the achievements of Old Boys'. To you Wayne our grateful thanks.

Our committee men are namely Bevan McNaughton, John Low, Rowly Currie, Neill Blackmore, Russell Read, Roger Wilson, Ryan Marshall and Peter Redpath. To you all my sincere thanks for your involvement and support.

As a result of the concerted and combined efforts of committee men, office bearers, coordinators, and the School Staff, allied with support from Old Boys', we as a group continue to grow.

It is pleasing to note that over the last nine months our number of Old Boy email addresses on our database has increased from 780 to 930. The number of financial members and life members has increased from 387 to 417.





Southland Boys' High School Band Uniform

The School Band was always prominent in any school celebrations. On the occasions of anniversaries, the Band regularly escorted Old Boys' from Queens Park to the school, playing all the way as the Old Boys' marched to the rhythm they created. Many of the Old Boys' would have been band members themselves when at school.

There is a splendid photo of the marching band in the museum. You can glimpse it behind the uniform

model. Such photos also appeared regularly in the Southlandian as the Southland Boys' High School Band was the source of great pride, encouraging musicianship in the school. It was also a familiar sight in street parades in Invercargill and further afield.

As can be seen the Band Uniform consisted of a jaunty cap and an elegant cape as well as the actual suit of the uniform. Strenuous fundraising was involved in the purchase of band uniforms. The following was reported in an early Southlandian: 'The sound of the School Band floating across the frosty air as they practised in the early morning...'

Southland Boys' High School also had a Pipe Band and a concert band.

1905 Cadet Shield

This year we are looking at four objects of interest displayed in the school museum. The first was created as a Champion Shield for the Cadets Shooting competitions. This is stated on the silver plaque across the top. Around the edge are small silver shields (with one missing) stating the recipient and the year of the award.

The most striking feature of this object is the embossed centre panel of copper. This shows an exquisite embossed representation of Nelson's flagship, aptly

named Victory, in which he was triumphant at the Battle of Trafalgar in 1805. His famous words, 'England expects every man to do his duty...' are engraved in the copper below the ship.

Of interest is the fact that this shield was presented in 1905 to mark 100 years since the famous battle. Of more disturbing interest is the fact that it was discovered stashed at the back of a classroom cupboard! Just as well we have a museum where it is now secure, archivally framed and bolted to the wall.

It is also interesting to realise that now it is one hundred and seventeen years since this shield was created to mark that historic event, and presented to the school.

Original Watercolour Plans


In Bay Four of our museum you can see the framed original watercolour plans drawn by Mair, the Architect for the new school building to be opened in Herbert Street in 1926. Previously our school had been on the corner of Forth and Conon Streets since 1881.

Of special interest is that in the second drawing, showing an aerial view of the proposed plan, it is easy to see that the central upstairs north facing area is labelled in upper case, MUSEUM. This proves that this site was the Architect's intention but unfortunately that was not carried out. So our school museum is in the tractor shed. We must wonder what the architect would have thought of that!

School Caps

Also in Bay Four you can see an assortment of school caps arranged on a climbing frame for display purposes.

The wearing of a school cap is no longer compulsory but they still have an important part to play in the bestowing of senior awards.

Fynn Mitchell – GODZone

How did you get involved in Adventure Racing?

Dad competed in GODZone in 2018 so I was pretty keen on doing something similar after seeing what it was about. I entered in a few 24hr races and got involved

with the FEAR society and their expedition races and ended up signing up for GODZone.

Why enter GODZone?

I wasn't initially going to enter GODZone this year as I still thought I was a bit young and didn't have the time for the training but a spot in a youth team came up around New Year's so it was too good an opportunity to miss. I had raced with a couple of the boys in the team before and knew that our mentor/coach Andy Magness had heaps of experience and would help our team go well, so I was pretty keen on doing it as soon as the spot came up. I entered GODZone as it was a pretty big challenge I wanted to achieve and I knew it would go into some pretty cool backcountry.

How did you prepare for the event?

I competed in quite a few races run by FEAR society that were mostly 24hr type races with a mixture of walking and pack rafting. These were held around Fiordland and were great preparation, as they involved climbing big hills with heavy packs and were mostly off track in the bush. I tried to do an event like this or a 10hr+ day walking or biking most weekends and an hour or two training on weekdays leading up to GODZone.

What was the course like?

The course was pretty long and brutal. The race started with a short trek/pack raft and a bike, then went straight into a massive 150km trek/pack raft that took 60 hours which was a lot longer than predicted. This



meant we were low on food and ran out with 6 hours to go. The rest of the course involved heaps of climbing on the bike and some long grinds in the pack raft. The course was one of the longest ever at 710kms so teams took longer than usual. We finished in just under 8 days.

What challenges did you face, mentally & physically?

Mentally it was pretty hard to keep yourself moving for such a long time and to stay positive when you're tired and sore. The main challenge was the lack of sleep which meant it was hard to stay alert and awake. Many nights I found myself falling asleep while biking or kayaking so it was pretty hard to force yourself to stay awake and moving.

How did the dynamics in your team work?

Everyone had a role in the team, with Zac as navigator, Josiah as captain, Molly as motivator and I was co-navigating. Zac and I made the decisions around where we were going and when we needed to push harder to make certain cut-offs and dark zones. Josiah and Molly made decisions around when we slept and rested based on how everyone was feeling.

Audrey Page – YES Finalist

Aubrey Page, Year 12, won the Southland Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) Company of the Year 2022 in the regional finals. Aubrey founded Eco-Smile which manufactures sustainable, plastic-free, vegan and



gluten-free toothpaste tablets.

Aubrey also received 3 of the 7 available awards – the Murihiku Mover and Shaker Award sponsored by ILT, the Innovation award, and the Primary Industry award – an incredible achievement. Aubrey will attend the National Young Enterprise Scheme awards to be held in early December in Wellington.

During the holidays, Aubrey was selected to attend BizVenture China 2022. The Young Enterprise Scheme (YES) partnered with the North Asia Centre of Pacific Excellence to offer 18 YES students an all-expenses-paid domestic programme, and Audrey said it was an amazing experience.

Oshadha entered a project titled ‘Pathogens on Paper’, that investigated whether there was a relationship between the number of borrowers of library books and the number of microorganisms in those books.

Sakaria Peseta – Cultural Excellence

Sakaria Peseta, Year 13 and Captain of Grant House, has proved himself to be an exceptional young man. Earlier this year, Sakaria won the Miharo Polyfest T-shirt design competition for 2022.

The theme for Polyfest was ‘Legends of Our Lands’, and Sakaria’s win was announced at the Miharo Annual Art Exhibition and Awards Night. Judge Johnny Peninsula said Sakaria’s entry was ‘outstanding and very fitting to represent us at Polyfest this year’. Sakaria also led the Southland Boys’ High School cultural groups in a passionate performance at Miharo Polyfest.

He was interviewed by the Southland Times in an article entitled ‘Southland teen a Samoan chief in training’. In the article, Sakaria talked about his upbringing in Samoa, his ambitions for his family, and the undertaking of a traditional pe’ā – the male tatau (tattoo) spanning from a man’s waist to his knees created using hand tools and the customary tapping method.



Sakaria’s design for the Miharo Polyfest T-shirt:

Polyfest started as a festival to showcase student’s heritage, an expression of the diverse Pacific Island cultures. Polyfest re-enforces student’s cultural identity and pride by bringing the cultures together in one place.

In my design, the bold letters of Polyfest are connected, symbolising the unity of Polyfest. A platform to showcase the various Pasifika backgrounds and languages as Polynesian people.

Below the Polyfest sign is a figure of a man carrying the weight of Polyfest on his shoulders. This represents the many unique legends of the Pacific, that tell stories of a people that protect, guide and provide for the needs of our Polynesian countries.

Underneath the figure of a man is the Va’ā, a symbol of our Pasifika ancestors. It embodies their brave navigation through turbulent seas, migrating to the islands they now call home. The Va’ā also symbolises knowledge of a culture that has been passed down through generation to generation.

At the right side of the Va’ā is a Taniwha, the protector within the sea. This is balanced with the eel, the provider, on the left side of Va’ā. The provider is connected to the coconut which represents the tree of life – as legends say.

Underneath the Va’ā are two patterns – Māori and Pacific – that are interconnected. The Samoan pattern designed from a chain is a symbol of sharing and connecting with one another. The other pattern which looks like flowers does not belong to one country but is linked to many islands, acknowledging how nature has the ability to satisfy the necessities of our people.

The circular shape and symmetry of the design reflects infinity, a symbolism that no matter which country in the Pacific you are from we are all interconnected and equal. The design pays respect to the natural resources within our lands and how they sustained our ancestors. This is an acknowledgement to our ancestors who toiled on our homelands, creating all the taonga within it from Fale to Va’ā.

As a Samoan, I am proud to participate in Polyfest. It is one of the best occasions we look forward to every year. A chance to come together and fully embrace who we are and those before us.

As part of Te Wiki o te Reo Māori, Māori Language Week, each House had to perform the school haka, toia mai (haka powhiri), and the school song. Sakaria donated a beautiful carved taonga to be presented to the winning House – deservedly being the first House Captain to hold this taonga aloft.

Called 'Talavalu' (War Club), the taonga was donated by Sakaria's parents when he went home to Samoa to receive his traditional tattoo. It was blessed through the Southland Boys' High School Miharo Polyfest performance, when Sakaria used it for the taualuga dance.

Lethan Pickett – Violin

Lethan Pickett, a Year 13 student, hand-crafted a beautiful violin. Self-taught, Lethan has made guitars in the past and wanted to try making a violin.

The front of the violin is made of cedar, the back from maple, and it has taken Lethan more than a 100 hours to make. This incredible achievement attracted a flurry of local and national media attention, with Lethan even appearing on Breakfast TV.

Thanks to School Patron Ken Bowie, Lethan was invited by the Chamber Music New Zealand committee to attend a concert by the New Zealand String Quartet entitled 'Letters from Iraq'. Iraqi national Rahim AlHaj – described as one of the greatest Oud players in the world – composed the music for the concert theme.

The musicians all played Lethan's violin, and were impressed with his ability. Lethan, his friend Champ Thiagarajan, and the Chamber Music NZ committee joined the musicians for dessert after the concert.





I let my line go and it starts cascading down into the pitch-black water of the magnificently glossy lake.



Model United Nations

In May, a Southland Model United Nations event was held in Invercargill, giving students an opportunity to debate on a current world issue following the format of a real United Nations debate.

Every student who attended was allocated a country, and given time to research the country's political views, interesting facts, and stance on the world issue that we were presented with. Southland Boys' High School had two senior students attend the event, with Hunter Jennings (Y13), being selected to represent Canada, and Ruairidh MacCallum (Y12), selected as the delegate for France. Each student had to follow the values of their selected nation, giving them an interesting perspective.

The theme for this year's event was censorship, with a focus on the extent to which a government should interfere with the freedom of expression of citizens and journalists within a country.

Working together and acting as the United Nation's assembly, a resolution was proposed, offering restriction on government interference in media. The event attendees debated about which parts should be added, edited, or taken away, to create a resolution which best lined up with the views of their country. At the end of the event, the group as a whole was given the opportunity to vote on the new policies put forward, making a decision about whether or not the resolution would be beneficial for the majority of the member states present.

Whilst the event gave attendees the opportunity to be immersed in real life issues with their peers, it was also a great opportunity to make connections with students from other schools in the Southland area. Towards the end of the event, several 'joke' amendments were proposed, poking fun at other attendees, including a proposition for the United Nations to declare nuclear warfare on Canada, as well as voting in favour of replacing the delegate for Russia with a baguette.

Overall, the Southland Model United Nations event was



a great opportunity for the youth of Southland to learn about how the United Nations works, while engaging in topical political discussions with other young people who have similar interests.

Overall, the event was incredibly successful and a great opportunity for any students who wish to be involved in debating events, or meet new people. Even though there is a focus on political discussions, Model United Nations events are a great source of enjoyment, and I would encourage all students to have a go.

ENGLISH

This year the Faculty welcomed two new staff to finally achieve a full complement of experienced specialists. Francine Knowles has joined us to teach junior classes and Cornelle White has joined us from South Africa. We are very lucky to have these wonderful women as part of the faculty and they bring with them a wealth of experience and ideas. We also farewelled Louise Viljoen who has moved to the Science Faculty and we thank



her for the kindness and dedication she has shown our students over the last four years.

We are also excited to be working with the new librarian Cris Crighton and fully endorse all her exciting changes and future plans. Maria Alcock has been appointed Teacher Librarian and is helping to develop that essential close relationship between the English Faculty and the Library.

Once again we have had success in external writing competitions with the prodigious talents of Oshadha Perera. He won first place in the Open Junior Section and first place in the Haiku Section in the NZ Poetry Society International Poetry Competition. In the Lancaster Writing Awards he won first place for Years 12-13 and in the Guernsey International Poetry Competition he was second in the Young People's category. Oshadha has been winning prizes for his writing since Year 9 and you can see the full extent of his success in another section of this magazine.

It is superb to see that students across all levels have the confidence to compete in writing competitions and we will continue to facilitate these opportunities. The Learning Support staff have worked hard this year to stimulate participation in the ICAS exams across several Faculties including English. They established writing groups and close reading tutorials and it was enjoyable to assist with this project and exciting to meet all the young writers in Year 7 and 8.

Next year much of our focus will be on establishing a comprehensive Year 7-10 literacy programme to prepare our students for the new co-literacy standards in Reading and Writing that will be implemented in 2024.

HEALTH & PHYSICAL WELLBEING

In 2022 Health & Physical Wellbeing (HPW) and senior Physical Education had the awkward start to the year with a Covid-induced mask-wearing mandate. This restricted many of the physical activities and exercises that we usually begin the year with. Athletics – both as a focus in PE and as a whole school event, was put on the back burner until later in the year.



We still had a strong focus on improving the overall wellbeing of students, including individual fitness levels, and classes were still able to participate in a variety of skill development opportunities throughout the first term even with the interruptions of Covid and mask mandates.

Term 2 saw the arrival of Mrs. Shontelle Gentle in the HPW Department. She took over the Year 9, 10 and 12 HPW/PED classes and has been a fantastic addition. She brings her experience in waka ama, ki o rahi and other traditional and contemporary games and activities to the department. We look forward to her continued enthusiasm and involvement within the department.

Mr. Cody Mason has become the Teacher in Charge of Outdoor Education (ODE). He has already made positive changes and additions to the Outdoor Ed courses with support from Mr McIlwrick and Mr Meijer. 2023 is already looking like a popular year, with ODE classes and numbers growing – including the addition of Year 9 option and adapting the current Year 11 course.

Year 9 and 10 HPW classes covered a variety of topics such as: values of the school and at your place; fitness testing; badminton and table tennis striking skills; volleyball and basketball skills; drugs and alcohol; round the park running programme; smoking and vaping awareness; diet and nutrition; turbo touch; athletics; handball and viperball; fitness awareness; anatomy; social responsibility within groups; as well as traditional Maori games such as ki o rahi and tapu ae.

Fitness testing remains a strong focus in Year 9 and 10 HPW during Term 2 and Four to gauge the development of students in a variety of physical strength and endurance tests. Classes measure, time, and record their fitness levels, all to help in the understanding of the limits of their physical strength. Goal setting is used to allow students to set a realistic target to work towards throughout the year.

Physical fitness tests are: a physical strength test both for the upper body and lower body, measured by pull ups/press ups and an explosive vertical jump. Agility and speed are measured by a timed weaved agility run. Aerobic endurance is calculated by the 20m Beep Test, and flexibility is measured by a sit and reach upper leg test.

Students are also assessed on a variety of practical skills throughout the year, graded by both their peers and staff. Unfortunately, general skills, fitness and application in a social team context seems to be getting harder for our young men to do. Blame Covid, technology and our inclement weather, but at the end of the day, students need physical exercise for their social, mental and emotional, spiritual and physical wellbeing.

We look forward to continuing to educate our boys by encouraging physical exercise not just at school, but outside of school time.

Outdoor Education

Term 1 in Outdoor Education was heavily focused on the water. Miss Hamilton used the consistent warmer weather to condense the term and run several kayaking trips for all three Outdoor Education senior classes. Valuable lessons were learnt by all students during this time about risk management and being aware in the outdoors.

Moving ahead into Term 2, with a change of staff and a change in focus, these classes moved away from the boats and into planning land-based excursions. Mr McIlwrick and his Year 11 ODE class completed the high ropes course at Adventure Southland, caving and a challenging tramp into Green Lake. Term 3 involved four sessions at the YMCA, both rock climbing and bouldering. The year was finished off with a trip to Central Otago, to complete the new Lake Dunstan Mountain Biking trail. This proved to be both a highlight

and very challenging Task which allowed students to gain NCEA Credits focused around an assignment and reviewing the trip.

The combined Year 12 and 13 class spent the majority of Term 2 planning for a Mountain Biking camp in Naseby. This involved students conditioning their bodies for an intense three days of hitting the trails in the Naseby Forest recreation area. Exploring this area, as well as participating in the game of curling was a highlight for several students.

There was also a Year 9 Outdoor Ed class for the first time in a few years. These students got to experience some outdoor challenges as well. Activities included: orienteering in Queens Park; rock climbing at the YMCA climbing wall; planning and camping on the Kepler Track; map reading and becoming more aware of managing risks in the outdoors. Risk management was based around Fire lighting, and how to control a fire, as well as being aware of other risks in the great outdoors. Many students (and staff) learnt valuable lessons during this task.

Moving into 2023, it is exciting to reintroduce a range of outdoor pursuits into the senior Outdoor Education courses. Several Southland Boys' High School students excel in this environment. To further challenge their skills, as well as develop their confidence and interpersonal skills, experiencing a broad range of activities both in the water and on the land will continue to allow our senior students to develop their character and shine in these challenging environments.



JAPANESE

New Zealand Schools Japanese Trivia Championship 2023

On the 17th of June, seven selected students from the Year 9 and Year 10 Japanese classes and Japanese culture lovers went to James Hargest College for the annual National Japanese Trivia Night Championships.

They were Southland Boys' High School Team 1: Thomas Mukur, Zephyr Jackson, Jack Phillip and Kupa McKerchar, and Southland Boys' High School Team 2: Levi Te Amo, Blake Frisby, and Lee Herrick.

We were tested on Japanese general knowledge and cultural knowledge, competing against teams from schools in Invercargill and across New Zealand.

Southland Boys' High School Team 1 ended up gaining 3rd place in the Southland Region. The second team also did their best. It was a night to remember for the students participating.

SCIENCE

2022 proved to be a challenging year for both staff and students. However, all did very well despite the compressed assessment time frames. Whether it was affected field trips, staff on sick leave or student absence through illness we never stopped and remained open for education. So, a very sincere thank

you for everyone, young and old, who just helped each other and kept things going.

I would like to particularly thank three new teachers in our Faculty – Ms Goswami, Ms Sarisa and Mr Billcliff who all acquitted themselves well in their first year of teaching at Southland Boys' High School. All quickly got into the swing of things and sought the highest of expectations from their classes. We also welcomed Ms Villoen to our ranks – a seasoned teacher of science who has impressed with her high academic expectations with her students.

We also bid farewell to Ms. Jessica Cross (aka 'Jess Cross the Science Boss' with apologies to Bill Nigh the Science Guy). Jess was a valued member of our team and a popular teacher who left for new teaching opportunities just up the road. We wish her all the best.

This year we were given a very short time to prepare for the Southland Schools' Science Fair at the Invercargill Working Men' Club. We asked for volunteers to compete. Four boys came forward. All worked in their own time while having the run of the Faculty's resources. Jacob Wilkinson-Hall (Year 10) produced an intriguing investigation into the quality and distribution of the wi-fi service network about the school. Blake McWilliam and Zane Hoyle (both Year 10) produced a study investigating the relative merits of pesticide and trap control of invertebrate pests in a Southland Greenhouse. Finally, Oshadha Perera (Year 12) produced an excellent investigation into pathogens on library books. Oshadha went onto to win the Year 11 to 13 prize.

Raymond Xie-Jones has applied for the North Invercargill Rotary Scholarship to attend the Auckland University holiday school. He is an excellent candidate with great prospects. This year quite a few Year 13 science students have applied for scholarships and grants. Staff have written references for these young men, and the quality of the Year 13 cohort augers well for success.

The Faculty too has changed in Term 3 of the year. Mr Boyce has evolved to be head of Faculty for Agriculture/ Horticulture and Agribusiness. Mr Boyce has been with the Science Faculty for decades where his cool head, incisive wit and good looks will be sorely missed. Mrs McMinn our Science Technician and backbone of the Faculty will be following Mr Boyce and looking after him. Both will be missed.

A vital teaching and learning resource arrived in the form of the Faculty's own CoW (Computer on Wheels). The laptops have seen heavy use and will be vital for students in the evolving landscape of NCEA.

Next year priorities for the Faculty are to finish and deliver new teaching materials for the national changes occurring in the senior science curricula. However, the main challenge for boys' learning remains the same – that being literacy. Boys are required to be literate and numerate in science, and computer literate, as we move towards the new NCEA regime. Deliberate teaching of literacy and computer literacy skills has never been more important for opening academic pathways for our young men. Literacy will therefore remain a key driver in the Faculty's teaching in the forthcoming year.

SOCIAL SCIENCE

The Social Science Department has had another busy year with several changes to staff, a student teacher placement and a number of field trips.

Our commerce department welcomed a new Head of Department Sonal Naicker who has joined us from Botany Downs College in Auckland. He is an experienced teacher with many years of practice teaching Economics and Business Studies.

Evasen Rajah is our new accounting expert and has joined us from South Africa. He joined us in the middle of a Southland winter and is bearing up very well considering he had never experienced snow before. Both new commerce staff have been warmly accepted by our boys and this is reflected in positive numbers for course selection in 2023.

In Social Studies Jordan Paskell joined us from the English department for a fixed term contract this year. She taught five junior Social Studies classes which is a huge commitment, and we shall miss her next year when she leaves us for greener pastures.

Kerry Williams joined us from Australia, and she has also taken on several junior classes. Kerry will be with us for 2023 and we are very pleased to have her. We have also appointed our student teacher Jordan Duncan who has skills in both History and Geography. He was well liked by the students, and we look forward to having him as a colleague.


Three staff members attended the Social Science Conference in Christchurch during the Term 3 holidays. This was a valuable experience and staff came back with a myriad of ideas. All department staff attended the Ministry of Education professional development about the new Aotearoa New Zealand Histories Curriculum, which was very informative and helpful in planning for next year.

Geography students have had the opportunity to go on field trips again this year. The Year 12 class went to Te Anau and climbed Mt Luxmore, where they completed their field work which looked at the differences in vegetation height at different altitudes and the natural processes that caused this. The students were able to stay the night in the Luxmore Hut and visit both the Clifden Caves and the Mt Luxmore Caves.

The Year 13 class greatly enjoyed their trip to Queenstown where they conducted field work about the spatial patterns of shopping centers at different locations. They surveyed members of the public and were able to map and analyse their results.

Academically the Year 11 Geography class were outstanding with an almost 100% pass rate for their internals and a 100% attendance rate for the end-of-year exam. We look forward to seeing them continue in this vein in 2023 and are looking forward to taking them to Aoraki Mt Cook for their Year 12 field trip.

In Social Studies the Year 10's had the opportunity to do some fieldwork in Queens Park and around the school



for the sustainability topic and they produced some interesting research.

Next year the department will have a drone which will be used to help students produce maps for their research (and no doubt it will also be used by the Media Studies classes to get some aerial footage).

History students greatly enjoyed learning about recent New Zealand history while examining the David Bain case through an historical lens. They also examined the impact of the Gallipoli campaign on New Zealand Society and looked at goldmining in Otago.

In 2023 Year 13 students will visit Arrowtown to look at the Chinese gold mining village.

Media Studies

In 2022 we had another successful year in Media Studies where students learnt about media concepts and how to apply them in a practical sense.

At Level 1 students created films that were either 'fake news broadcasts', an urban legend, or an important memory. They should be proud of the products they produced. When studying media coverage of a current event, the story of Whittakers using Te Reo for their wrapper developed in a way that was quite unexpected.

In Level 2 the brief for their short film was to look at the 'day in the life' of a character. This produced a range of interesting and innovative ideas from racism, the death of a pencil, a day in the life of a hostel boy, and entertaining comings and goings of Sunny Hills Retirement Villages.

The Level 3 students examined different developments in the media and looked at the representation of the haka. For designing and creating a film, their brief was to produce a silent horror. They produced films with compelling narratives and thoughtful production values – looking at the danger of a mystery parcel, walking the dog in the woods and danger in the hostel.

Commerce

Commerce is the use and exploration of accounting, economics, and business concepts and models to make sense of society and solve problems. The Commerce



department offers Enterprise Studies for Year 10, Commerce for Year 11, and Accounting, Economics and Business Studies for Years 12 and 13.

This year, the Year 12's and 13's business students took part in the YES enterprise challenge and did exceptionally well while competing against other schools in Invercargill. Aubrey Page won the YES Southland Company of the Year 2022 regional final award.

Aubrey also received three more awards: the excellence award for Innovation; excellence award for Murihiku Mover & Shaker, and excellence award for Primary Industries. He will now move onto the National awards to be held in early December in Wellington.

Year 10's participated in the business activity in school whereby they formed groups and sold their products and enjoyed some decent profits. This was a great opportunity to demonstrate their entrepreneurial skills and gain vital experience of running a small business.

This year was a challenging year for the students and teachers but thankfully, together we were able to cover all the internals and make students ready for the exams.

Letters home

I stepped out of the casualty clearing station. The sea was an artist's palette, the water going from blood red to tangerine, from deep violet to magenta. The sinking sun cast long shadows on the beach. Every now and then, a gunshot would ring out in the distant air, its echo raining on us a few seconds after. All we could do was hope it wasn't aimed at us. I turned back towards the trenches, pausing to take one more look at the figure lying on the make-shift bed, the white sheets with crimson soaking through them and the eyes that are shut.

When we first landed here, the fields were covered with white-petaled roses. Sometimes, I would lie on the grass and look at the ocean, pretending I could see home if I looked high enough over the horizon. From the photos Mum had sent with her letters, I knew she still kept my coat hung beside hers. A daily reminder to her of her son who went to a distant land, and a daily reminder to me that we might never see each other again.

Darkness crept in, one step after another. Five hours left till I had to go back on duty. Finding an empty space in the trenches, I lay down on the mud and watched the moonlight draw shadows in the trenches. The fields that used to be dotted with flowers were now strangled with barbed wire. Unmoving limbs and unblinking eyes stared into the sky. Occasionally, the screams of someone from the casualty station would pierce through the air. I had taken Charlie there in the morning, and all I could remember was how his leg was bent at a wrong angle. The stench of sweat and morphine had hung in the air, as I watched him being dragged into the crowded tent.

I closed my eyes and let out a deep breath, willing my mind to forget about Charlie. I had a few hours to get some decent sleep, and I still hadn't replied to Mum's last letter. Taking

out the envelope from my bag, I watched her cursive writing for a few seconds. Until now, all my letters had told her magical tales about the gentle ocean and how nice it is out here. Even if she didn't believe my fairy tales, I wanted her to think that I was happy out here. The stench of gunpowder and decaying limbs, and the pools of blood that bubbled in the sun and froze under the moon had all loomed in my mind, like a cloud that was getting heavier and heavier. I knew, though, that every cloud would eventually break apart.

Earlier, I had restocked by bag and prepped my rifle for tomorrow, when we would be launching an attack to capture the ridges. So far, we had been the people who shared stories at night and waited weeks for the international mail to arrive. We had been the ones who dragged corpses from No Man's Land and spent the nights staring at the sky. But the moment we left the trenches, we would be nothing but targets in cross-hatched gunsights. Bullets would come raining on us. They might hit my helmet and bounce off, or they might pierce through my ribs, making my ears ringing from the impact. The ringing would eventually fade off, but my eyes would stay in darkness, trying but failing to see the last white roses in the fields. I would finally realise that I would never get to sit on the sofa and eat mum's apple pie again; that I would never have a chance to tell her about the ocean and ask how things were in the farm.

The echo of a mine exploding in No Man's Land drifted in the air. The walls of the trench shook, mud and rocks showering me a few minutes later. I held my pen with a shivering hand and watched the blue ink fill the paper with hidden stories and broken clouds.

After last season ending with a loss in the Southland Secondary School final we looked at this season as our year to come back. With our core team for the past few years now in Year 13, we had high hopes for the season, and the team did not disappoint.

Coach Sander Meijer was back and ready for the



season, and the boys were glad to have his knowledge and game experience around the team. With interruptions throughout the year his stability helped the boys make it through the season. Winning the Friday night competition was a goal from the start, with great displays of teamwork and individual skill, the team chemistry was at a high with the team going through the round robin undefeated.

Throughout the season with convincing wins over the other standout competition like Hargest, Verdon, and Aparima, the team was building every game. With New Zealand squad player Cody Stevens putting on a clinic against Aparima scoring 47 points.

To end off the secondary school competition we faced off against Hargest for the third year in a row. This was our time to get revenge from the past year. We had eyed up this game from the start of the season and we proved to be too much for them to handle, as at half time we held a 48 – 29 lead. Going into the second half we knew we couldn't take our foot off the throttle and we pushed the lead to 50 Points to win 93 – 53 led by Hunter Areaiiti-Burgess and crowned the Secondary School champions. Later that evening our captain Caleb Williams was announced the 2022 MVP of the league.

The team had three interschools over the course of the season. With a lot of the boys playing rugby, these games were a great opportunity for younger players to get experience at the interschool level against top Dunedin schools. First off, we faced John McGlashan College where the game came down to the wire with

Jonnies height being too much for the boys to handle. They ended up beating us 78 – 75 despite a great 30 point effort from Cody Stevens.

Next up we made the trip up to Dunedin to play the historic interschool against Otago Boys' High School where they started off hot. Combined with a slow start from the young group, we were on the wrong side of a 38 – 17 deficit. Mack Raines and young buck Thomas Spain combined for 45 points which started a second half run but proved to not be enough.

The third and final interschool saw King's High School come down and play us at home. The boys started off hot with Cody Stevens having a big first quarter and then leaving to play his rugby. With him leaving the team struggled as the King's star player started to get going. In the third quarter we went on a run and started to claw back, both teams stole the lead down the final stretch, but King's managed to have the final say. A notable performance from Mack Raines in putting together 32 points and the team going down 72 – 81.

The Tuesday night Southland Mens' League was used as a way for the boys to face off against the top competition in Southland. In the first week of the competition the team faced off against the top team in the league and after a tough fought battle the team managed to be within 15 points which proved to be the closest anyone got to beating the Magic this year. After some tough losses over the weeks, we saw ourselves face off against the Northeast Ballers who have two Sharks players in the second division final. The Ballers





had an eight point lead at half time but the young bucks showed that they are able to play mature basketball under pressure. Led by an efficient 36 points from Cody Stevens and 25 from Mack Raines, we put on a convincing win 92-77.

By the end of the season the tournament that had been delayed since 2020 was right around the corner, which had the boys excited to go head to head with the top talent in the South Island. With a tough loss to rivals Otago Boys' High School in the tournament opener we saw ourselves face off with top dogs St Andrews College – which a Southland Boys' High School team has never beaten. St Andrews started off hot with their top two players scoring 20 points in the first quarter alone. The boys were stunned and knew they had to regroup quickly if they wanted to stay in the game. In the second half everything came together perfectly for the team and with the home crowd behind them they finished strong and upset the powerhouse private school.

Coming out of pool play, we were set to play off for 17th to 20th. Next up was Riccarton High, who we swept aside 102-78, with a dominant inside game from our big men. A rematch versus fellow Southland Schools Grand Finalist James Hargest, saw us completely take control of this game with a commanding 95 – 45 win. We dominated all facets of the game in a resounding 50 point win, early on Saturday morning. At this stage of the tournament our legs were tired but thankfully Ryley MacRae stepped up and his energy and presence was felt with his sharp shooting.

The final placing game saw us have a rematch versus St Andrews – who were intent on bouncing back from our earlier victory over them. As this was Captain Caleb Williams last game for the team he had been a part of for the last four years, he put on a display of his all around skillset, dropping a game high 33 points to beat them again.

The last game saw eight out of the ten players leaving, and this was the last game for many of the boys that have been in the team for three years, so it was great that we finished in fashion. After a great season I would like to thank Sander Meijer for being the backbone of the team and giving up his spare time to help the team. We would also like to thank our Manager Simone Cameron for giving up her Tuesday and Fridays nights to provide chat on the bench and supply the much-needed lollies at halftime.

In the road race Magnus was in the bunch and taking his turn to look at getting in a breakaway group. The opportunity arose and he along with two other riders broke away and worked hard to establish a good lead. Magnus looked to attack on numerous occasions



but was shut down with neither rider prepared to have a crack with Magnus. This resulted in a sprint to the finish and they crossed the line locked together. Magnus picked up the bronze medal. Ollie showed great determination in the U14 road race. Chasing a breakaway, he rode solo and caught the two riders but as he was having a well earned drink they attacked again and established a lead. Ollie again went solo to chase them down but eventually had to sit up and wait for the peloton. In the final sprint to the line Ollie crossed in 4th place.

The Otago Southland Road Cycling Championships were held at Teretonga in perfect racing conditions in September. Magnus Jamieson and Oliver Keast represented Southland Boys' High School, competing across two disciplines – the time trial and road race. Magnus took the gold medal in the U17 section and Oliver the silver medal in the U15 section.

A big two weeks of cycling was held over the October school holidays. First up was the Junior Yunca Tour of Southland. Magnus Jamieson had a very strong tour. At one stage Magnus was in the yellow jersey and finished 2nd in four of the stages. Magnus won the Sprint Ace jersey after accumulating points in just about every stage.

The following week saw the NZ Secondary Schools Track Championships held in Invercargill with schools from throughout the country represented. This event also doubled as the South Island Schools championships.

The National Results are as follows:

In the U20 section Jesse Willis, Liam Ramsay and Magnus Jamieson got themselves into the team sprint gold medal final. A great race but they couldn't quite pull it off and had to settle for Silver.

In the U17 individual age group Magnus won Gold in the Keirin and Gold again in the Tempo race. To cap off an outstanding week he won silver in the Scratch race. Overall Magnus won the Gold. Liam Ramsay also competed in the U17 age group. Liam finished 4th in the Scratch race. 4th in the Keirin and 3rd in the Tempo race. This enabled Liam to claim the bronze medal overall.

In the U14 age group Oliver Keast won gold in the 2000m Scratch race, 3rd in the 515m Scratch race, 4th in the 2500m point a lap race which gave him an overall

Omnium podium finish of 3rd to claim the bronze. Cooper Robertson competed in the U13 age group. Cooper finished 3rd in the 1500m Scratch race, 3rd in the 515m Scratch race and 3rd in the point a lap race. This gave Cooper an overall podium finish of 3rd – at his first nationals a bronze medal. In the Y7/8 section Cooper Robertson and Oliver Keast won silver in the team sprint.

A very successful year of cycling for the Southland Boys' High School cycling team, which culminated in Magnus Jamieson being awarded the Southland KIA Team of the Year for his Cycling Southland U17 team sprint pairing at the ILT Southland Sports Awards in July.

FOOTBALL

1st XI

The 2022 season saw the 1st XI football squad of 20 boys compete in our three traditional interschools and in the Linwood Trophy tournament held in Invercargill.

Under the leadership of new captain Dylan Hawkes, our focus at the beginning of the season was on our interschools and building a squad to play in these games. Outside of school training, commitments made it challenging for the entire squad to get together for preparation. For the first time in many years, we had an entirely senior squad, with the majority of players competing on Saturdays in the local Men's competitions in their respective teams.

- The continued input and support from the school, staff, Old Boys', parents, and whānau both physically and financially of the students in the sport in 2022.

During the 2022 season I was dragged along to the Southland trials by my club teammate. The Southland team would travel away to Christchurch for four days to play in the New Zealand Men's Nationals. After what I thought was a pretty good trial on my behalf, I found out I had made the Southland A team. This left me shocked as I couldn't believe the selectors had seen me as one of the best in Southland. Again, I hummed and uhhed about this opportunity because it was a whole new environment to me being surrounded by many people I hadn't met before.

After some convincing I decided to play and travelled up to Christchurch in August of 2022 to play in the Nationals. Deciding to play in this team was the best sporting decision I think I've ever made. It allowed me to learn from the best players in Southland and to be coached by double NZ representative for Netball and Basketball, Donna Wilkins. Being exposed to a coach like Donna and learning from her and the opportunities she gave me is something I will forever be grateful for. It allowed me to drastically improve my game and gave me the confidence to put my skills into serious game situations.

This became evident in Christchurch at the Nationals, as even though I was playing against some of the best players in the country I was still somewhat able to hold my own and score a few goals. At the end of Nationals, I found out I had been selected in the New Zealand U20s team. My selection into that team was only made possible because of the support I had around me throughout the week of Nationals from Donna,

the Southland coaching and management and also the other players in my team who continued to encourage me no matter what happened.

Making the NZ U20s meant I played a game against the Australia U17s at the end of Nationals which we won by one point. After that we were invited alongside the U23s, mixed and men's NZ teams to Auckland where we would play our respective counterpart teams of Australia in a three-game series in October. Leading up to this we had weekly zoom calls as a team with coaches and management and given training programs to complete to help us get ready for the series.

Upon arriving in Auckland, we had two days to prepare as a team and to build team chemistry before we played our first game. After two days of intense training, we were ready to play our first game against the Aussies. The game came down to the wire and unfortunately a few mistakes led us to lose by three points.

After this game we had a day in between our next to prepare and learn from our mistakes in the first game. We learnt from our mistakes but not as much as we would've liked as this time we lost by two. This was a tough blow for us as we were leading through the majority of the game and the loss meant we had also lost the series.

The plus side to this was it meant we had a 'nothing to lose' attitude going into the third game and didn't have any pressure weighing on us. This, as well as learning from the first two games, proved valuable for us as we managed to get a win in the series. We won the third and final game by one point – one singular point. Everybody was ecstatic as our families were there to see it. Although we lost the series, we sent the Aussies home with them knowing the last time they versed us, they lost.

I will forever be grateful for the opportunities Netball has given me both on and off the court. It has pushed me out of my comfort zone, taught me valuable life lessons and skills and has allowed me to meet some amazing people and create meaningful relationships with people that I hope will last a lifetime.

Netball has taught me skills like comradery, leadership, sportsmanship and discipline. It has also given me opportunities to meet people from across New Zealand and from across the ditch in Australia. I plan to continue playing Netball and pursuing my dreams of one day
